Rail Road Meeting.

A meeting of the citizens was held in the Court House on Wednesday night 7th inst. Mr. W A Templeton called the house to order and nominated J T Parks to act as chairman, who was unanimously elected. Mr W L Miller was made secretary.

Capt Parks stated that the object of the meeeting was to consider the propriety of sending delegates to Enright's Store, on the next day to confer with Dr Matthews, President of the Elberton and Petersburg Railroad, with reference to building a rail read from Elberton to this place. On motion of W.C. Benet, Esq., the following gentlemen were appointed to attend the conference as delegates from Abbeville: J. T. Parks, T. C. Seal, P. Rosenburg, L. W. Perrin, G. C. Hodges and R. R. Hemphill. On motion of Capt. M. L. Bonham the meeting adjourned subject to call of the chairman.

Abbe. C. H., S. C., Oct. 10th '85. A meeting was held in the Court House to receive the report of the committee appointed to meet and confer with parties from Elberton, Ga., with a view to the building of a rail road from this point via Enrights, thence to Elberton. Capt. J. T. Parks, chairman of the former meeting, took the chair. J C. Miller was requested to act as secretary. At the request of the chairman Mr. G. C. Hodges gave an interesting account of the interview between the committee and Drs. Matthews and Oliver, of Elberton, who were met by the committee at Enright's Store. It appears that a charter exists for a rail road from Elberton to the Savannah River. Col. J. E. Calhoun proposes to unite with the projectors of the road for the purpose of continuing the road from the river to Enright's Store on the Savannah Valley Railroad. Dr. Matthews and his friends seemed to consider their road as an assured fact, and exexpressed themselves as anxious that Abbeville should connect with them at Enright's Store. Dr. Matthews desires that Abbeville move in the matter by procuring a charter to Savannan River. He assured the committee that there were two possibilities, by this route of a western connection. 1st. By the Elberton Narrew Guage Road which connects with the Air Line. 2nd. By building a road from Elberton to Athens a distance of thirty-five miles, to connect with the Georgia system to Atlanta. It was also suggested that the road might be extended castward from Abbeville via Hodges or Greenwood to Clinton, thence to Chester and thence to Moro on the North Carolina Central Road.

Mr. Hodges thought that the preference of Dr. Matthews, and others interested with him, was for a narrow guage road and gave some interesting information in regard to the construction and operation of such roads. Capt. Parks was then asked to ad-

dress the meeting. He did so briefly, substantiating Mr. Hodges' account of the meeting. After some discussion by those present, on motion of Mr. L. W. Perrin a committee was appointed by the chair to procure the necessary char ter. The following committee were appointed: L. W. Perrin, L. W. White. T. C. Seal, J. C. Miller, M. L. Bonham. Jr., Geo. C. Hodges and W. C. Mc-Gowan.

The following resolution adopted:

Rice who stated that he had not put much faith in the road before to-day, but that now he felt confident of success. Mr. McCullough, of Greenville said that he did not doubt but that the road would be built.

The road is to run from Fruit Hill, or some point in Edgefield County, to Ninety-Six thence to within a haif mile of Cokesbury, to cross the river at Wares Shoals, thence to Pelzer and Piedmont and on to Greenville. meeting will be held here on November 13th inst. for the purpose of electing officers. A full attendance of the stockholders is desired.
