WORK PROGRESSING AT PORTMAN SHOALS

New Plant Will Soon Be Completed and Ready for Operations

Work of installing the machinery at Portman Shoals has been progressing nicely and it is understood that practically all of the heavy machinery to be used in the rebuilt plant has now been placed. With favorable weather conditions, and if there are no mishaps, the new plant will soon be entirely completed. When the new machinery is all installed the new plant will have a capacity of 7,100 horsepower. This is a considerable increase over the power that the plant was formerly able to furnish. When the fire occurred some time ago, there was some considerable machinery slightly damaged which can still be used and some of the apparatus has already been repaired and is now running. In hauling out the new machinery which is to be installed, it was necessary at some points for the company to strengthen some bridges and in a few instances it was necessary to erect entirely new ones. Traction engines were necessary in order to transport the machinery from Anderson to the plant. SENDING PLANTS BY MAIL Cabbage Plant Rate Can't be Changed Washington, Jan. 24 - Senator Tillman has been informed by the post-office department that after consideration, as the present rate of postage on cabbage plants, except by legislation, as the present rate of postage on one cent for each two ounces of seeds, plants, bulbs, roots, etc., is fixed by the statute. Senator Tillman thought that the Postmaster General might, by simple order, change his rate so as to give the plants the benefit of the parcel post, and conducted a long correspondence with this in view.
