South Carolina Comptroller Recommends Repeal of the

School Levy.

Columbia, Fe.b 2 .- Declaring the present system of taxation in South Carolina inequitable and utterly inadequate for supplying the money necessary to meet the expenses of the government, and urging the removal of constitutional restrictions upon levying powers of the legislature. Comptroller General Jones today called on that body for a complete re-vision of the present basis of raising

the commonwealth's revenue.

From 1860 to thep resent time Mr. Jones traces the history of taxation in the State, showing how the demands for the same purposes have grown greater, how new ones have arisen and the present system of raising funds has proved impractical and fel-

len short. methods of procuring money for South Carolina's money for South Carolina's current expenses, he says, were introduced by the reconstruction government estabthe reconstruction government estab-lished in 1868. Until 1876, prior to the political revolution, the needs of the State were met by bond issues un-til the commonwealth was practical-

Increased Demands.

Increased Demands.

Following the inauguration of Governor Hampton in 1877 the expenses were kept within the annual income until 1898. The growth of the State about this time and other causes created an increase in demands for punils improvements. Extension of State charitier and other institutions, as well as the increased cost of the indictary system, contributed the general need for more mency.

Since that time expenses of State institutions have been increasing. For instance, from 100,000 in 1897 the State Hospital for the Insane in 1913 required \$200,000. Appropriations for educational purposes have shown a proportionate increase. The Legislature in 1914 is asked for \$2,500,000 for State expenses, while in 1897 less than \$1,000,000 was required.

These figures, says the comptroller, the mead of a practical system by which the necessary revenue can

by which the necessary revenue can be equably raised and an equable sys-tem can be devised only by ascertain-ing the actual value of property to be, taxed.

Repeal School Tax. Repeal School Tax.

There Mr. Fonce calls attention to the fear people have of a true valuation, particularly on account of the arbitrary constitutional three-mile tax for educational purposes, which, if levied on property at its actual valuation, would raise more than \$2,500,000 yearly. For this reason the comptroller asks the legislature to minute to the people an amendment constitution providing for a 1 of the school tax so as to impose this to be appropriated in the discretion of the general assembly according to the varying needs of the schools.

schools. Comptroller General Jones renews his recommendations made to former lagislatures that a single and permanent fax commission be created and vested with the power to supervise the assessment of property for taxation.

Witness Before the Committee.

GOVERNOR HAS ALSO BEEN ASKED

Review of Work of General Assembly Shows That Very Little Constructive Work Has Been Done Up to This Time.

Columbia, Feb. 2.—The special committee from the general assembly to investigate the management of the State Hospital for the Insane will hold its first meeting tomorrow after-noon at 3 o'clock in the chamber of the supreme court. The committee has organized by electing Senator Mauldin of Pickens chairman and Mr. Wyche of Spartanburg secretary. The other members of the committee are Senator Young of Union, Senator Strait of Lancaster, Mr. Hunter of Bamberg and Mr. Stevenson of Chesterfield. Senator Weston of Richland, appointed a member of the committee, resigned on account of a letter from the governor in which it was said that the Richland senator had appeared before the board of regents of the State hospital as an attorney for one of the persons to be investigated. Senator Weston denied that he had acted as an attor-ney, although he daid he had been asked to do so, and declared that he attended the meeting of the board of regents as a member of the senate committee on penal and charitable institutions. Senator Weston asked that his conduct in the matter be investigated.

Senator Tillman, the governor, the members of the board of regents of the State hospital, the State Park commission, the secretaries of the board and the commission, Dr. J. W. Babcock, superintendent of the State Basecck, superintengent of the State Hospital for the Insane, and others will testify before the committee. Schator Tillman, who has been ill, has written Mr. Wyche, the secretary of the committee, that he will come to Columbia to testify on February 7, if

his health permits.

The pending probe of the management of the State Hospital for the Insane was brought about by a special message from the governor, read in the house on January 20.
