**URGES REVISION  
 OF TAX SYSTEM**

South Carolina Comptroller Rec-  
 ommends Repeal of the  
 School Levy.

Columbia, Feb. 2.—Declaring the  
 present system of taxation in South  
 Carolina inequitable and utterly in-  
 adequate for supplying the money  
 necessary to meet the expenses of the  
 government, and urging the removal  
 of constitutional restrictions upon  
 levying powers of the legislature,  
 Comptroller General Jones today  
 called on that body for a complete re-  
 vision of the present basis of raising  
 the commonwealth's revenue.

From 1860 to the present time Mr.  
 Jones traces the history of taxation in  
 the State, showing how the demands  
 for the same purposes have grown  
 greater, how new ones have arisen  
 and the present system of raising  
 funds has proved impractical and fel-  
 len short.

Present methods of procuring  
 money for South Carolina's current  
 expenses, he says, were introduced by  
 the reconstruction government estab-  
 lished in 1865. Until 1876, prior to  
 the political revolution, the needs of  
 the State were met by bond issues un-  
 til the commonwealth was practically  
 bankrupt.

Increased Demands.  
 Following the inauguration of Gov-  
 ernor Hampton in 1877 the expenses  
 were kept within the annual income  
 until 1895. The growth of the State  
 about this time and other causes cre-  
 ated an increase in demands for pub-  
 lic improvements. Extension of State  
 charities and other institutions, as  
 well as the increased cost of the ju-  
 diciary system, contributed the gen-  
 eral need for more money.

Since that time expenses of State  
 institutions have been increasing. For  
 instance, from 100,000 in 1897 the  
 State Hospital for the Insane in 1913  
 required \$300,000. Appropriations for  
 educational purposes have shown a  
 proportionate increase. The Legisla-  
 ture in 1914 is asked for \$2,500,000  
 for State expenses, while in 1897 less  
 than \$1,000,000 was required.

These figures, says the comptroller,  
 show the need of a practical system  
 by which the necessary revenue can  
 be equably raised and an equitable sys-  
 tem can be devised only by ascertain-  
 ing the actual value of property to be  
 taxed.

Repeat School Tax.  
 Then Mr. Jones calls attention to  
 the fact that the present system of  
 taxation, particularly on account of the  
 arbitrary constitutional three-mil-  
 lion tax for educational purposes, which  
 is levied on property at its actual  
 valuation, would raise more than \$2-  
 500,000 yearly. For this reason the  
 comptroller asks the legislature to  
 "submit to the people an amendment  
 repealing the present school tax, and  
 in lieu thereof providing for a  
 general property tax, to be levied  
 at the discretion of the general assembly  
 according to the varying needs of the  
 schools."

**ASYLUM PROBE  
 STARTS TODAY**

**Senator Tillman May Be  
 Witness Before the  
 Committee.**

**GOVERNOR HAS  
 ALSO BEEN ASKED**

**Review of Work of General As-  
 sembly Shows That Very Lit-  
 tle Constructive Work  
 Has Been Done Up  
 to This Time.**

Columbia, Feb. 2.—The special  
 committee from the general assembly  
 to investigate the management of  
 the State Hospital for the Insane will  
 hold its first meeting tomorrow after-  
 noon at 3 o'clock in the chamber of  
 the supreme court. The committee  
 has organized by electing Senator  
 Mauldin of Pickens chairman and Mr.  
 Wychie of Spartanburg secretary. The  
 other members of the committee are  
 Senator Young of Union, Senator  
 Strait of Lancaster, Mr. Hunter of  
 Hamberg and Mr. Stevenson of Ches-  
 terfield. Senator Weston of Rich-  
 land, appointed a member of the  
 committee, resigned on account of a  
 letter from the governor in which it  
 was said that the Richland senator  
 had appeared before the board of  
 regents of the State hospital as an  
 attorney for one of the persons to  
 be investigated. Senator Weston de-  
 nied that he had acted as an attor-  
 ney, although he said he had been  
 asked to do so, and declared that he  
 attended the meeting of the board  
 of regents as a member of the senate  
 committee on penal and charitable in-  
 stitutions. Senator Weston asked that  
 his conduct in the matter be investi-  
 gated.

Senator Tillman, the governor, the  
 members of the board of regents of  
 the State hospital, the State Park  
 commission, the secretaries of the  
 board and the commission, Dr. J. W.  
 Babcock, superintendent of the State  
 Hospital for the Insane, and others  
 will testify before the committee.  
 Senator Tillman, who has been ill, has  
 written Mr. Wychie, the secretary of  
 the committee, that he will come to  
 Columbia to testify on February 7, if  
 his health permits.

The pending probe of the manage-  
 ment of the State Hospital for the  
 Insane was brought about by a spe-  
 cial message from the governor, read  
 in the house on January 20.
