OUT OF TROUBLE AND IN TROUBLE

Negro Escapes Minor Charge and Then Arrested in Connection With Murder Case.

Bob Walker, a negro, whose name appeared on the record of Magistrate Broadwell for trial yesterday, on a charge of carrying concealed weapons, escaped punishment on that score, but a few minutes later was taken in custody by the sheriff on a warrant which charged that he was an accessory before the fact in the killing of Gus Brown, which occurred in this county on Sunday, Feb. 8. When the case for carrying a pistol was called against the negro yesterday no one appeared to prosecute and on motion of attorneys for the defendant the magistrate dismissed this case and Walker was a free man. However, very few minutes had elapsed before he was again taken in charge, and this time on a much more serious charge. It is said that Bob Walker, the defendant, let Pink Brown have a pistol and advised Pink to go and kill Gus Brown. This Pink Brown did, losing his own life in the difficulty. The complaint against Walker alleges that he did incite the negro, Pink Brown, to commit the act, and that he is therefore an accessory before the fact. The preliminary hearing in the case will be called in magistrate's court this afternoon at 3 o'clock, and considerable interest will surround the outcome of this investigation. Magistrate Broadwell will hear the case.
