ADDRESSES HEARD AT PALMETTO THEATRE

LADIES OF THE CITY ARE URGED TO ATTEND

CLEAN-UP WORK

F. M. Burnett and Dr. Ashmore Will Deliver Addresses to the Ladies This Morning

The third step in the Board of Health-Y. M. C. A. Chamber of Commerce-Civic Association Joint Clean-Up, preparatory campaign will be pulled off today promptly at 8 o'clock at the Palmetto theatre when Chairman Burnett will deliver an illustrated lecture on cleanliness at the play house. The lecture will be well up to the high standard of efficiency which Mr. Burnett has set, and every lady in the entire city is expected to attend. It will be well worth hearing.

It was only decided late yesterday to have this lecture and The Intelligencer has been requested to give the same publicity. Dr. Ashmore of the Board of Health will also probably assist in this lecture.

It will be the fifth successive lecture delivered in the last three days by Secretary Burnett. Those held yesterday drew record crowds. Mr. Burnett is a fluent talker and is extremely well posted on the topic which he will discuss. The slides are also elegant and up-to-date.

It was stated at the office of the Chamber of Commerce Friday that everything in the great joint clean-up contest was moving nicely, and every body is ready for the real work as it shall begin Monday, 5th inst., and that Mrs. Rufus Faint, President of the civic association, is expecting greater cooperation from the ladies than ever before.

The city will clean up all the streets and also put on extra teams. 1,000 clean-up buttons will be distributed by Mr. Dugay, chairman of the advertising committee. The finance committee, consisting of E. E. Elmore, Dr.

Elmore, and others, will be on hand sometime Tuesday, to arrange the financial end of the work.

Special effort will be made to eradicate the weeds growing along the railroads, and special instruction given. City Health Officer Campbell will handle the city's end of the work, since cooperation of all forces in the city has been secured.

Prof. Hemmenway of Carlisle, Pa., civic expert, will not be here, but an effort is being made to get another well known expert here, to address a mass meeting later in the week.

Cooperation of all students in the public and private schools and of all our presidents has been secured.

To aid southern merchants and manufacturers to extend their trade with Central and South American countries and the West India Islands particularly the new fields to be opened by the Panama Canal through South Atlantic and Gulf ports, President Fairfax Harrison announces that the Southern Railway, C. N. O. & T. P., Alabama Great Southern and Mobile and Ohio, have appointed as south American Agent Mr. Charles Lyon Chandler, who has been South American commercial expert in the consular bureaus of the state department. His office will be at Chattanooga, Tenn.

Mr. Chandler has had years of experience in Central and South American countries and is thoroughly acquainted with their markets and the needs of their people. He will advise southern merchants and manufacturers as to where their wares can be sold, will aid them in preparations of letters and circulars and advise as to the methods of packing required for different markets.

Mr. Chandler will keep in touch with commercial bodies of Latin American countries and their diplomatic representatives at Washington and will be able to give southern business men the earliest possible information in regard to government and other large contracts to be let. He will also begin a campaign of Latin American markets calling attention to goods that can be shipped from the South and the advantage of shipment through southern ports.

Mr. Chandler is admirably equipped for this work. A Harvard graduate, he studied international law at the University of Buenos Ayres, Argentina, and was for many years in the consular and diplomatic service of the United States, the greatest part of his time having been spent in Latin America. His service will be at the disposal of southern merchants and manufacturers without any charge to them.
