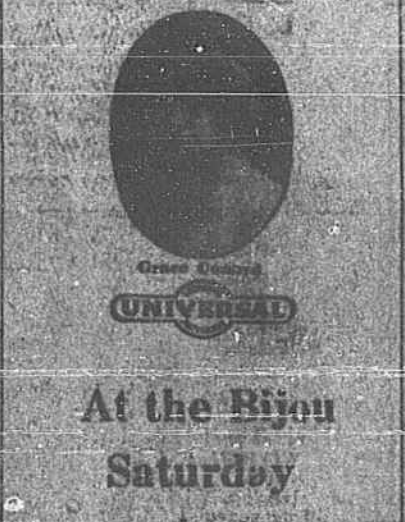

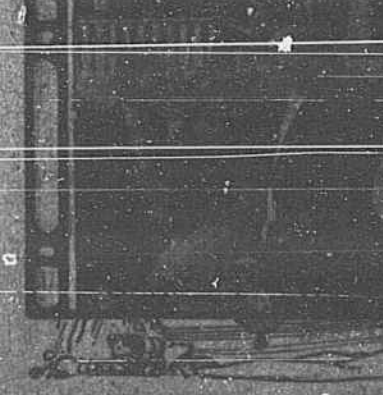

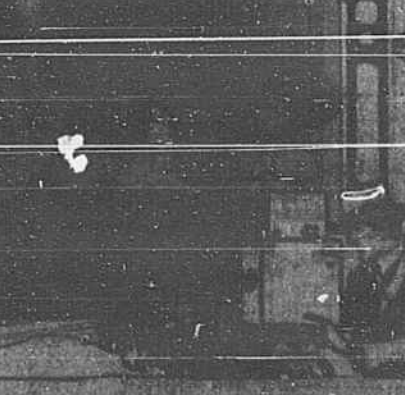

## GEN. VILLA BUYS S. C. CHICKENS

### So Fond of Fighting That He Orders "War-Horses" For Amusement In Peace.

Anderson people have heard and read much of General Villa, but naturally no Anderson man can claim a personal acquaintance with him. However, there is one man in this section far surpassing any other man in South Carolina in regard to personal intimacy with the famous rebel leader and that man spent yesterday in Anderson. S. J. Heater of the town of Heater, came here yesterday on business and while in the city exhibited a letter he had just received from General Villa in which the general ordered that 25 of the finest "Heater Warhorses" fighting cocks to be obtained by ship to him at once in a quiet and unobtrusive style. The famous Mexican leader said that a shipment of Heater's Warhorses ordered by him sometime before had proved to be far superior to any chickens found in Mexico and that they had won time and time again against terrific odds in the Mexican ring. The general said that he was highly pleased and that as soon as he got the word shipment of these famous chickens he expected to clean up everything in Mexico.

General Villa read in Grit and Steel, world-famous chicken fighting paper, published at Gaffney by Ed DeCamp. He at once wrote to Heater with the above results.

Grit and Steel is the only magazine of its kind in South Carolina and one of five of the kind in the entire United States. Grit and Steel at Gaffney, The Feathered Warrior at Lake, N. C., Southern Pit Games at Blakely, Ga. and Ducky Game Bird at Tell City, Ind., constitute the entire list of game chicken papers published in the United States. Each of these is devoted exclusively to fighting fowls.

How Ed DeCamp ever acquired a magazine, now famous the world over is rather interesting. The paper was started by a certain DeCamp

employ, rather Sherrill by name. Sherrill has little home and he steadily got into DeCamp's debt for the printing of the paper. Finally he proposed to DeCamp that he would give DeCamp the paper if the publisher would square accounts against him and give him \$50. This the publisher agreed to do, and today DeCamp has a publication for which he has refused \$10,000 and would probably refuse \$20,000 should any one make that offer. The magazine goes into every country of the civilized world where the English language is written and spoken and is sold in America alone the publication has a circulation of over 500 copies. In Mexico thousands and thousands read every issue and wait anxiously for the coming of the next month and the appearance of their stand by.

When General Villa read Heater's advertisement in Grit and Steel he at once concluded that he would like to see the champion to try out on his enemies of the pit in Mexico and he immediately over the first shipment was ordered yesterday.

Before the war broke out in Mexico, Mr. Heater shipped many of these cocks to that section at fancy prices but since that time the traffic has been demoralized and the country is torn up that it has been impossible to get any of the fowls delivered. It is probable that General Villa could get them were it not for the fact that he has a determination of men to secure the game fowls in total fashion from the express cars at the shipping quarters and there they are fed for the battle with every care and attention until the battle is finished.

## MORE CRITICISM AND PRAISE FOR COMMONER

### Has Passed Safely Thru Furnace of "Sarcasm" Criticism and "Ridicule"

(By Associated Press)  
Washington, April 4.—The uniforms of state department footmen, the compensation, the Panama tolls fight, Secretary Bryan's salary and his educational lectures, and half a dozen other subjects occupied the "Commoner" today. During consideration of the executive bills, "and judicial, appropriations bills."

Comments included provision for a coachman and footmen for the Bryan carriage, which provoked comment. "We ought to have a secretary of state," he said, "who would not have to get something to England and visit the navy platform to excite abroad and the country from the difficulties into which it had fallen through him."

His appropriation was returned for the state department. Representative Johnson of South Carolina said Secretary Bryan was obviously planning to put himself in the hands of the British.

Whether the British Union Jack should be displayed on the front or the back of the uniform is a matter of taste, he said, but that it should be prominent somewhere is without question in view of the recent surrender to Great Britain on the canal zone question.

## PUBLIC HEARINGS

### On Various Bills Relating to the Staple Standardization and Cotton Futures

Washington, April 4.—The house agricultural committee will proceed with public hearings beginning April 22 on various bills relating to cotton and staple standardization and future transactions, regardless of the action of the New York cotton exchange in agreeing to change its form of contract to that of the committee. It will be based on government type of grades and based on commercial rather than a legal difference.

Chairman Lever of the committee said today sentiment was crystallizing in favor of his bill looking to reform exchange operations, and that very step possible would be taken to hasten legislation which will do the work of regulating the exchange vigorously and effectively in the interest of the people.
