





So Fond of Fighting That He Orders "War-Horses" For Amusement In Peace.

Anderson people have heard and read much of General Villa, but, naturally no Anderson man can claim a personal acquaintance with him. However, there is one man in this section far surpassing any other man in South Carolina in regard to personal intimacy with the famous rebel leader and that man spent yesterday in Anderson. S. J. Hester of the town of Hester, came here yesterday on business and while in the city exhibited a letter he had just received from General Villa in which the general ordered that 25 of the famous "Hester Warhorses" fighting cocks to be obtained by shipped to him at once in a quaint and suitable style to a famous Mexican leader said that a shipment of Hester Warhorses ordered by him sometime before had proved to be far superior to any chicken found in Mexico and that they had won time and again against terrific odds in the Mexican pits. The General said that he was highly pleased and that as soon as he got the second shipment of these famous chickens he expected to clean up everything in Mexico.

General Villa read in Grit and Steel, world-famous chicken fighting paper, published at Gaffney by Ed DeCamp. He at once wrote to Hester to thank him for results.

Each of these is devoted exclusively to fighting cocks.

How Ed DeCamp ever acquired a

magazine, now among the world over, is rather interesting. The paper was started by a retired school employ, Luther Sherrill by name. Sherrill had little money and he steadily got into DeCamp's debt for the printing of the paper. Finally he proposed to DeCamp that he would give DeCamp the paper if the publisher would square accounts against him and give him \$50. This the publisher agreed to do and took DeCamp has a publication for which he has refused \$10,000 and would probably refuse \$25,000 should the one raise that offer. The result is that DeCamp is the only man in the country of the United States where the English language is written and spoken in South America alone the publication has a circulation of over 100,000 copies. 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REPORT WILL BE MADE PUBLIC NEXT TUESDAY

New Finding by Detective Burns
in Frank Case Not Yet Given Out

Atlanta, Ga., April 4.—The report of William J. Burns, the detective who has been investigating the murder here last April of Mary Phagan, a factory employee, in which crime, Leo M. Frank, superintendent of the factory where she worked, is accused to be the killer April 17, will not be made public before Tuesday or Wednesday of next week. Friends of Frank, who employed Burns, hope that through the detective's efforts, to have the life of the condemned man.

An announcement that he would not disclose the results of his investigation was made here tonight by Burns, who reached this city late today from Chicago. The detective said that he had not submitted his report to Frank's lawyers and denied that he had stated that Frank was not guilty. "I will say positively," he added, "that I believe Frank entitled to a new trial." Burns would not say upon what he based his conviction and refused to indicate even in a general way, the nature of his evidence as developed by his investigation. He reiterated the assertion that there was no mystery as to the identity of Mary Phagan's murderer, who, according to Burns, left a trail.
