### "CONSCIENCE" ACQUITTES HIM

**John D. J. Feels That He Has Done His Duty as Miner**

(By Associated Press)

Washington, April 6.—John D. Rockefeller, 23, son of the richest man in the world, testified today before the House mining committee about the question of his personal responsibility for the industrial strife which has kept the coal fields of Southern Colorado in turmoil for six months.

After more than four hours of cross-examination, Mr. Rockefeller had told the committee that his "conscience acquitted him" of having done his full duty in respect to the striking coal diggers by placing competent men in charge of the mines.

Members of the committee spoke of Mr. Rockefeller's interest and took in various "split movements" and asked why he had not gone about welfare work in the Colorado coal fields in a similar way.

"I did just exactly as I have done in all my other investments," he said. "I picked out the best available men, I paid them, I trained them, and I trained them to do their best."

Mr. Rockefeller said that he would consider the situation of the miners in the Colorado coal fields as a matter of public interest, but he would not take any action.
