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MEMBER OF COUNCIL RESIGNS POSITION

MUCH BUSINESS TRANSACTED LAST NIGHT

SANITARY CHANGES

City Fathers Refused to Prohibit Women of City From Wearing Hats to Shows

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Discussed Widening Whitner Street. Agreed to pay City Tax Assessor an additional \$1,000. Granted Chantango to show without license.

The Anderson city council held a remarkable meeting last night, the first of the kind since the death of Mayor Fannin.

The first thing discussed in council after the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was that the Board of Health of Anderson can not be paid \$1.00 per meeting as agreed upon.

That so far as health shall receive compensation and that if any member refuses to serve after having accepted he may be fined \$25.

B. B. Blackham and O. D. Anderson presented a petition from the property owners of the east side of the Place and Whitner street praying that Whitner street be widened about two and one half feet by taking some space off the plaza and court house square and the remainder off the side walks.

An invitation was presented the mayor and council by Anderson lodge No. 1296 B. P. O. Elks to attend the services held in connection with the laying of the cornerstone of the new Elks Home on April 10.

Council agreed to refund to G. F. Carter the sum of \$25, this being for "used license." Mr. Carter has sold his pool room and is no longer connected with this city.

Water and light committee recommended that certain types of hydrants be installed from this time on with two hose instead of one, thus making it possible to attach a steamer.

Council adopted a suggestion from the mayor to request that all streets along in Anderson be equipped with sanitary water traps.

The city treasurer made report that approximately \$20,000 had been paid on bonds and that the new issue was \$15,000.

It was reported that there was no money with which to carry the running expenses of the city government from the date until August and that he estimated \$10,000 would be necessary for this.

Allderman L. P. Fouché, because of the fact that he is moving to Atlanta presented his resignation as allderman from ward 1. Council accepted Mr. Fouché's resignation with regret.

It was understood that special meeting will be called to take place at which time a date for the election of Mr. Fouché's successor will be fixed.

Council adjourned at 10:15 o'clock.

The report received here says that Mrs. Murdock is the wife of James J. Murdock and a daughter of John Thomas Ashley, Sr., who is about 51 years of age and has three children.

Dr. Babb and Shultz of Home, Pa., were summoned immediately after the shooting took place and Dr. Babb told The Intelligencer last night that he could hardly hope for the patient's recovery.

It is said that Mrs. Murdock has been in ill health for some weeks and this is presumed to be the reason for the rash act.

Mr. and Mrs. Murdock have been married for about 15 years and the domestic relations have always been happy.
