School Affairs Transacted Today

Today will be a busy day with the educational interests of the county. The first matter of interest is the county teacher's examination which has been ordered by J. B. Felton, superintendent of education. The second matter of interest is the election of the teachers for the next session for the public schools of the city and together with these two events the O'Neal Oratorical Contest is going on at Belton. With these three very important affairs underway the people of Anderson who are interested in things educational will have their hands full. It is probable that there will be about 40 or 50 applicants for teacher's licenses, while there are to be 63 teachers elected by the board to serve in the Anderson city schools during the coming term.

New Signal For Fires

The fire department yesterday tested out the new system installed by the Southern Public Utilities Company and found it to be satisfactory in every way. Heretofore it has been necessary for some one to telephone the power house before additional power could be secured. With the new system it was yesterday demonstrated by the chief, without the knowledge of the Southern Public Utilities Company, that the water could be secured in two minutes from the time that the alarm reaches them. This will be quite a valuable addition to the present service and will mean a great deal to the fire department.

Honea Path Will Have Good Roads

A committee of Honea Path men, consisting of J. W. Clement, L. A. Morris and Reed Clement came to Anderson yesterday for the purpose of securing a quotation on a road scrape attached. They closed a trade for the machine and it will at once be sent to Honea Path for the purpose of road work on the streets of that bustling town. The committee, in conversation with a reporter for the Intelligencer, said that their town was now going ahead faster than it had ever done before and that business conditions there are splendid.

Work Began Yesterday Of Tearing Down Old Structure On Main Street

This property, which is located just next door to the Intelligencer, has been vacant for some time and the owners, Mrs. D. S. Watson and E. P. Vandiver, have determined to remove it and in its place will be erected one of the city's handsomest buildings. The new building will be two-stories in height and will be finished in the most up-to-date and complete manner. It is understood that there are already inquiries from several owners and it is probable that the entire building will be rented before its construction is ever begun. RUPERT BLUE Will Order a Study of Cause of Malaria in Greenville Special to The Intelligencer. Washington, April 30.—Surgeon General Rupert Blue, of the public health service, today advised L. F. Hollis, general secretary of the Farmer Cotton Mills Company's welfare department at Greenville, in response to Mr. Hollis's request, that the public health service would be glad to send representatives to Greenville to study and report on the causes of malarial fever in that locality, with the consent of the state board of health. This information was also given Representative Johnson, through whom the negotiations have been carried on. Some time ago Mr. Hollis, at the request of the county board of health of Greenville, took the matter up with the public health service through Mr. Johnson, and the service stands ready to undertake it. It was suggested to Mr. Hollis, however, that he secure a letter from the secretary of the state board of health, stating that board's willingness for the federal bureau to undertake the work. Dr. Blue further stated, however, that there might be some delay in the carrying out of the plan, owing to the fact that a number of the physicians of the public health service had been ordered to the Mexican border, for possible service in that region in the event of an increase in the number of soldiers by reason of the Mexican revolution.
