TOLSTOY'S WORK

St. Petersburg, May 9.—The government has decided to send the steamer Hertha and Andromeda and the motor ship Tatiana to search for the Arctic explorer Lieutenant Sedoff, who started for the North Pole two years ago, supposedly attempting the use of Polar bears as draught animals.

The relief expedition will be commanded by Captain Isliantoff. It will first proceed to Pankratoff Islands on the coast of Nova Zembla and if Lieutenant Sedoff should not be there the Hertha will take the stores from the Tatiana and 50 Siberian dogs and go to Franz Josefland with the Andromeda cruises northward along the coast of Nova Zembla to Cape Galania, the Tatiana meanwhile returning to Archangel. In case of need the Hertha will winter at Franz Josefland, making winter quarters by choice and by choice. If the expedition proves fruitless, a storm will be started and the Hertha will return in the fall of 1915 to Archangel.

An expedition is also being sent to the Karische coast to search for the Captain Brussloff and Lamanoff, who are also missing.

M. Butskoff, formerly a retary of Count Tolstoy, who has been lecturing on the contents of the 30,000 volumes in his 72 languages. The Russian society comprised 300 works, the English 2,415, the French 1,444 and the German 602.

Among the manuscript was found after Count Tolstoy's death was the manuscript of a play entitled "Peter Martyr." The chief character is a man who had devoted his life solely to the acquisition of wealth. He had performed no good works. He falls seriously ill and one night in a dream sees himself being weighed in the scales on the day of judgment. The scales are found in his favor by an old beggar who has laid in them a loaf, which Peter Martyr threw at his head to get rid of him. Peter awakens and recovers. He becomes an open handed man as he was close histed before. Although his wife and others try to persuade him that his lavish generosity only excites envy and jealousy among the recipients. Eventually he allows himself to be sold in servitude. A friend discovers his whereabouts and then "fills away his deep breaths."

The scientific world in Russia has for some time been occupied with the sinking of the Caspian Sea. The surface of the Caspian, which lies 27 yards below the ocean level, has since lower. The shrinkage is even now keeping increment for navigation, as steamers in many places cannot reach the landing stages. Technical investigations have failed to find convincing explanation, though Professor Schalkoff, commissioned by the government to study the subject, has ascertained that the amount of water contributed by the rivers flowing into the Caspian—especially by the Volga—has considerably diminished. It is therefore possible that the river water flowing into the sea is not sufficient to make the loss good by evaporation.

Dr. Starokoltzky who has been lecturing before the medical society at Blagovestchensk on the spread of the morphia habit in the Amur territory, said that children were addicted to it before reaching their teens. In one person statistics showed that of every 100 prisoners about 50 were morphia victims. The same proportion was found among the hospital patients. A large number of morphia clubs existed at Blagovestchensk, and it was a common sight to see morphia addicts making injections in the open street.

"THE HOLY SHROUD"

Causes a Lot of Excitement as to Its Authenticity.

Berlin, May 9.—The display of the Holy Shroud at Turin during Easter has again brought up the question of its authenticity. Two men, one a scientist and the other an artist, have arrived at the conclusion that the shroud possesses the true likeness of Christ. Dr. Paul Vignon, a Frenchman, after long investigation declares that the Holy Shroud bears a striking resemblance to the portraits of Christ caused by vapors from the body being upon the stuff impregnated with oils and alcohols.

Sir Wyke Baylis, President of the Royal Institute of British Artists, is convinced that the portrait of Christ in the Catacombs of San Callisto here was made by a contemporary artist, that the one who had seen his subject, and as the faces of the Shroud and the Catacombs are the same, it might be concluded that the Holy Shroud really enclosed the body of Christ. It was taken from Cyprus to Chandyani (then part of Italy) in 1452 and has since been in Turin.

"The Shroud," the British Medical Journal, said at the time that Dr. Vignon brought up this theory. "There seems to be little room for doubt that Dr. Vignon has established that the outlines of the shroud are due to the emanations of vapors. Its exclusively access to have been the material must have been the body of a crucified person and one who underwent scurvy and the other concomitants of death, which by both the scriptures and tradition are ascribed to the passion of Christ."

J. T. WATT RESIGNS.

J. T. Watt has resigned the position of live stock demonstrator at the annual husbandry division at Clemson College. Mr. Watt resigned his position to accept the position of State agent of a corporation for Alabama. He brought into South Carolina some 20,000 sheep and the first carload of pure bred live stock produced on the cooperative plan.
