**New Home Is Near Completion.**  
The handsome home being erected by William Laughlin on Main street is now almost completed and Mr. Laughlin said yesterday that he would move in one day during the coming week. It will be remembered that Capt. Laughlin lost his home and all its contents by fire some weeks ago. The new house is going up on the old site and is very pret. and complete throughout. Mr. and Mrs. Laughlin have been making their home at the Chiquita hotel since the fire.

**Cover Crops Are Cut Back.**  
The farm demonstrator for Anderson county returned to the city yesterday from a complete trip of inspection all over the county. Mr. Rethrock says that in most sections the cover crops have all been cut back, the cotton has been planted and corn planting will begin this week. He says that practically all of the school demonstration plots have been plowed and that most of them are sowed in cotton. He expressed himself as being well pleased with the progress made by the farmers during the last week and believes that conditions all over the county are good. He is expecting big yields for the season.

**Very Anxious About Brother.**  
Miss Eva Garrison of Sandy Springs was in Anderson yesterday and said that she was very anxious just about her brother, Ernest P. Garrison, who is now in Vera Cruz. Miss Garrison says that her brother is a United States marine and that he landed in Vera Cruz from the ship "Hancock" last week. Since that time she has heard nothing from him and she is very much afraid that he may have met with some mishap in Vera Cruz. No dispatches have mentioned Mr. Garrison's name and it is therefore probable that Miss Garrison's fears are unfounded.

**Argued Motion For Bail Here.**

**More Whites Than Negroes.**  
According to figures made public yesterday by the census department of the government Anderson's population counts for 1913 were 7,453 white people and 1,289 negroes. In 1910 there were 6,283 white people and 1,371 negroes. Therefore the proportion of increase among the negroes and the white people is almost the same. It is taken that the estimates furnished by the census bureau this week are certainly more nearly correct than were those of two weeks ago.
