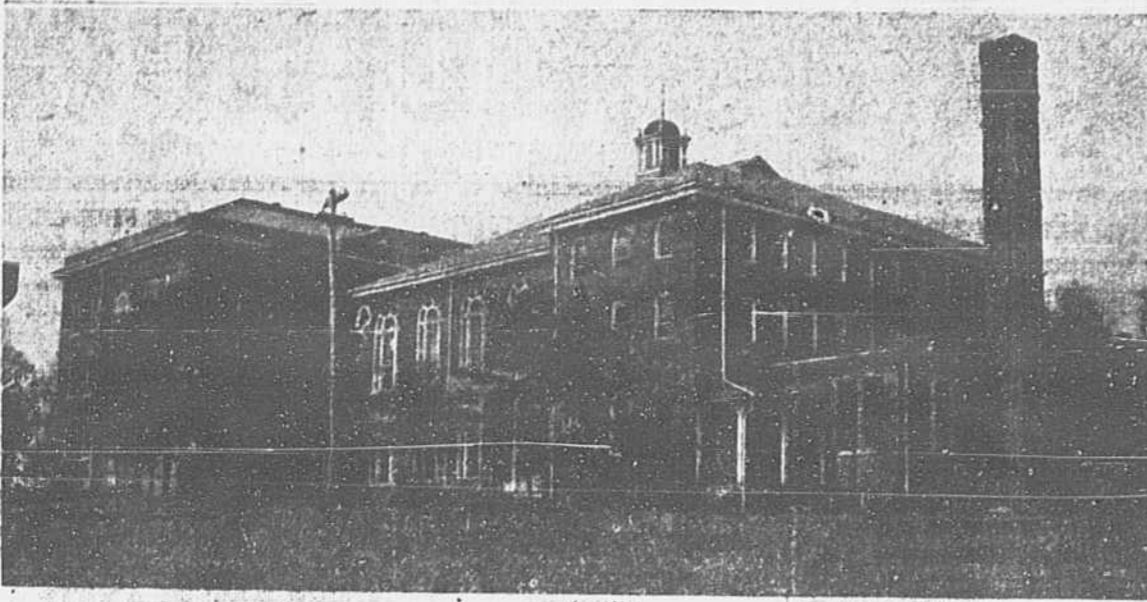

COURT READY FOR THE THIRD WEEK SESSION

SECOND WEEK CAME TO A CLOSE YESTERDAY

HEARD THE APPEALS

No Jury Cases Were Tried Yesterday Afternoon and Court Adjourned at 1 O'clock

The second week of criminal court for Anderson county came to a close yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock when adjournment took place. The third week of the criminal court will convene Monday morning.

No jury cases were tried yesterday morning. Judge Prince having dismissed all jurors Friday night and the morning deliberations of the court consisted of appeals.

The state vs. John Scott, larceny after trust with fraudulent intent. Appealed from Magistrate J. B. Leverett's court at Starr. New trial granted.

Town of Pendleton vs. Davis Hicks, violating whiskey ordinance. Judge Prince reduced fine from \$100 to \$50. Counsel gave notice of intention to appeal from court's order to supreme court.

Town of Belton vs. Robert Lindsay, H. J. Lindsay and John Snipes, resisting arrest. Intendant's judgment reversed and dismissed case.

The state vs. G. Johnson, breach of trust. Appealed from court of Magistrate Bonner, Pelzer. New trial granted.

The state vs. Jesse Meeks and J. P. Jenkins, breach of peace. Appealed from Magistrate Trussell, Honea Path. Judgment of magistrate reversed and prosecution dismissed.

The state vs. Dave Hagood, violating labor contract. Appealed from court of Magistrate Riley, Piedmont. Magistrate's judgment reversed and prosecution dismissed.

The state vs. Frank Allen, Dan Hollingsworth and Alex Hipp, gambling. Appealed from court of Magistrate Bonner, Pelzer. Judgment of magistrate affirmed and fines reduced from \$25 to \$15.

City of Anderson vs. J. C. Griffin, W. H. Godfrey and E. C. Nealey, gambling. Judgment reversed and remanded for new trial.

The state vs. Andy Shaw, violation labor contract. Appealed from Magistrate Broadwell's court. Judgment reversed and prosecution dismissed.

The state vs. Dave Hagood, violation labor contract. Appeal from Magistrate Eley's court, Piedmont. Judgment of lower court reversed and prosecution dismissed.

The state vs. Henry Hawkins, George Smith, Frank Peterson, Webster Hagood, Joe Robinson and J. W. Ward, gambling. Appeal from Magistrate Acker's court, Williamston. Judgment reversed and prosecution dismissed.

BANKRUPT STOCK SOLD YESTERDAY

Fouche Drug Company Holdings Bought in By Orr-Gray Company for \$1,080

S. M. Wolfe as trustee, yesterday sold at public auction the stock of drugs of the Fouche Drug store, located in the Chiquola building on the square. This store was closed some time ago and went into bankruptcy. The stock yesterday was sold in bulk to the Orr-Gray company for a consideration of \$1,080, which is said to be a remarkably low price for the splendid line of drugs. Men who are familiar with the line carried by the Fouche company say that this was a bargain price for the goods.

A few other incidentals, such as chairs, tables, a desk, etc., were disposed of at private sale to different individuals.

It is said that the stock of goods purchased yesterday will at once be transferred by the Orr-Gray company to its place of business on the square.

CANDIDATES CENTER ON AUDITOR'S OFFICE

PLENTIFUL SUPPLY COMING UP FOR THE RACE

NEW LOCOMOTIVES

Indications Are That Five Or More May Contest For Office Held By Winston Smith

There is no scarcity of candidates for any office in Anderson county but there seems to be an over-supply for that of auditor here. With the incumbent, Winston Smith, preparing to offer for reelection, there are already two announced candidates in the field to succeed him, and it is now probable that two or three more may appear. It seems that the would-be office holders of the county have centered on the job of auditor as the one they all want. Mr. Smith is offering for re-election on his own merits.

The first candidate to announce for this position was R. A. Abrams of Starr. Mr. Abrams has been thinking of entering the race for sometime and while in Anderson yesterday, he authorized the announcement that he would be a candidate. The other candidate to announce yesterday was J. R. C. Griffin of Broadway township who said "I will certainly be in the race unless something unforeseen should turn up. I believe that I can be elected."

Mr. Abrams once held the position of superintendent of education of Anderson county and is said to have had some strong political backing. He is a man of ability and he could fill the office.

Mr. Griffin was also a school teacher at one time and for five years he was bookkeeper at Ware Shoals. He possesses all the qualifications of the office and he would make a good auditor.

Earl Keaton of Flat Rock another local school teacher was in the city yesterday and he said that he, too, is seriously considering entering the race. He has not yet made up his mind, but he thinks that he will offer for the position. Several others are being mentioned over the country.

ESTIMATE MADE BY GEN. TEAGUE

Ranking Officer Says That There Will Be Between 800 and 1,000 Veterans Here

The Anderson chamber of commerce telegraphed to Gen. B. H. Teague yesterday morning, asking for an estimate as to the number of veterans coming here Wednesday and Thursday for the reunion. The commander telegraphed Mr. Whaley yesterday his estimate and says that there will be between 800 and 1,000 veterans from all parts of the State to come here.

Anderson people have all along contended that there would be fully one thousand veterans here for the two days of the reunion but many seemed to think that there would not be more than 500 veterans to attend. As it is, the officials of the reunion have received advices from all parts of the state from the veterans saying that they are planning to make the trip and it is believed that there will be more veterans at the Anderson reunion than at any other reunion within the last few years. Practically all arrangements are now complete and there is little left to be done before the reunion convenes.

Agricultural Bill Passes. Washington, May 23.—The senate tonight passed the agricultural appropriation bill which carries about \$19,700,000, a little more than the house provided. Before its passage tonight Senator Smoot criticized it as a particularly bad measure.

Methodists Adjourn. Oklahoma City, May 23.—After being in session for eighteen days, the quadrennial general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, formally adjourned tonight. The selection of the place for holding the next conference has been entrusted to a special committee named for the purpose.
