ONE CASE IS TRIED

Jury Deliberated Only 45 Min utes In Trial of Men Charged With Murder Spann Aiken

At 6 o'clock last night the case of the State against M. T. Gilbert and Ford Springfield, sharged with the murder of Spann Aiken, went to the jury. After 45 minutes deliberation

This case excited great interest all over the county and people were pres-ent from all sections, especially from Piedmont, to hear the testimony and watch the progress of the case. It was possibly the hardest fought legal battle of the present term of court and James H. Price of Greenville, attorney, for the defendants, out up one of the most determined fights ever made in the Anderson court house. General opinion seem-ed to expect an acquittal.
