ESSANAY STUDIO, JUST COMPLETED, MODEL BUILDING.

The new studio building that has just been completed by the Essanay Film Manufacturing Company, in Chicago, is just about the last word in efficiency.

The new building stands on a lot adjoining the old studio—is built of reinforced brick and stands three stories high. The studio floor is

spacious, covering over a hundred feet in length by fifty feet in width. A hundred and twenty Copper-Hewitt mercury lights have been installed for the overhead lighting.

A gigantic paint frame takes up the east end of the building. The property room is on the main floor and everything in the way of household goods, etc., can be located in an instant.

The lighting arrangements are perfect, and every picture that is made in the new studio will have the advantage of "light from the sides," that is, there can be no dark spots in any scenes that may be staged, unless the director so desires, and then the lights may be placed anywhere in or about the scene where they will do the most good.

The new building will accommodate several times as many people as the old studio does. The dressing rooms have been fitted up for the comfort of those who will have to use them.
