One hundred and seventy of these were said to have been put to death in the Federal pentientiary, and 60 executed in the prison of Santiago Taitelacalco. Most of the victims, it was asserted, are officials.





HUERTA TO RETIRE

Carranza Is Bull Headed and Insists Upon Becoming Provisional President

(By Associated Press.)

Washington, July 11 .- A survey of developments in Mexico within the last 24 hours has convinced officials and diplomats here that internal peace is near at hand. The appoint-ment of Francisco Carbajal as minister of foreign affairs means the retirement of General Huerta as provisional president within a few days, according to messages from the Mexican capital.

The capture by the constitutionalists of Guadalajara has emphasized that the military triumph of the revolution is inevitable. This is the tenor

This is the tenor of the information reaching officials here along with the news that persons prominently identified with the Huerta government are leaving the country wit htheir families, fearing reprisals by the constitutionalists.
