The "Big Three" Who Will Try to Lift America's Cup

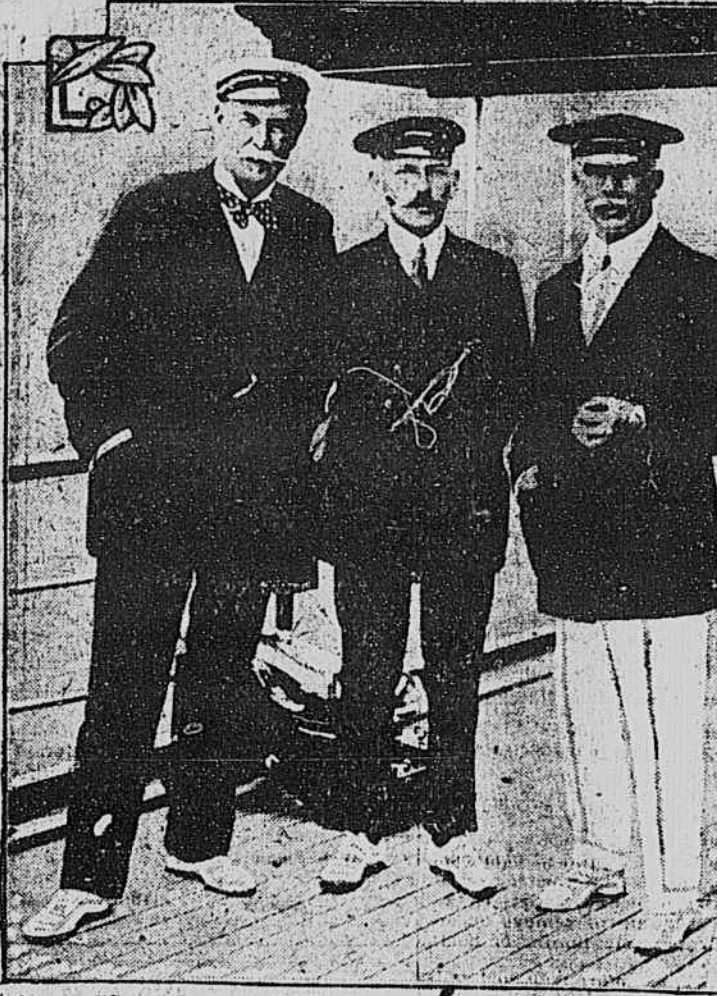
