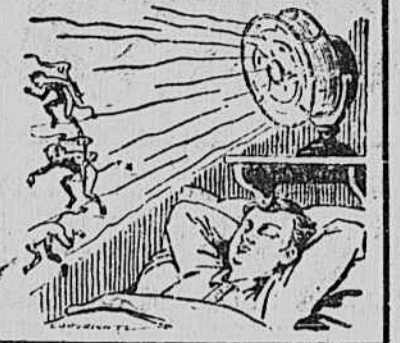

THEATRE CONTRACTOR IS READY TO BUILD

ARRIVED IN THE CITY TO MAKE ARRANGEMENTS

ARCHITECT IS HERE

Directors of Development Company Well Pleased With All Plans for Building

Chas. K. Bryant, architect for the new \$60,000 theatre-store building which is to be erected here by the Anderson Development Co., successors to the Anderson Theatre Co., arrived here from Richmond yesterday afternoon. Shortly after his arrival Chas. K. Rooney, representing the H. Keith Theatrical circuit of Atlanta and Richmond, arrived here. It is understood that Mr. Rooney represents the interests of the theatre part of the building. He, however, gave out no interview.

Immediately after the arrival of the two gentlemen a meeting of the board of directors of the Anderson Development Co., was held at the offices of the chamber of commerce, when the plans for the theatre were submitted by Architect Bryant. Mr. Rooney explained the stage settings, etc. About two hours time was spent by the board in going over and examining the plans which are very extensive and elaborate, calling for a seating capacity of 1,200, six boxes, orchestra, fireproof wall, fire escapes, Irish motion machine, men's reception rooms, etc. The office part calls for three store rooms, basement, arcade and reception rooms. Upstairs is divided into 19 offices or apartments.

President Fowler stated he was well pleased with the plans, but he would not state that they would not be changed slightly; he stated that a meeting of the board will be held today at 10:30 to finally pass on same, and he hopes to have the work well under way for the building by Monday. Contract will call for completion, it is understood, on or before December 10.

DAY OF GRACE FOR VOTERS HAS PASSED

NO MORE CHANCE TO GET ON ROLL

CLUB LIST CLOSED

Yesterday Was Last Day For Voters of South Carolina to Properly Enroll Their Names

Maybe Anderson county voters will not like the sound of "I told you so," but all those doomed to disappointment when they try to vote on August 25 and find that their names are not on the club roll, will have to admit that it was through no fault of the newspapers. Almost every newspaper in the district has labored to get as many enrolled as might be possible and now since the last day has come and gone it is the fault of the voter and his alone if his name does not appear and if he is prevented from voting.

While official figures of the enrollment in all parts of the county were hard to get last night, on account of wire trouble, it is understood that practically as many voters have enrolled as voted in the last primary election. In some precincts it is said that even more are enrolled, which can doubtless be attributed to the fact that one or two precincts have been dispensed with.

In order that the voters may understand what is now to be done with the club books the following, known as Article 12 from the new rules, is reproduced in full:

On the last Tuesday in July in each election year, which shall be the last day of enrollment, the club books shall close; and within three days thereafter each secretary shall transmit the original roll to the county chairman, who shall forthwith cause to be made and shall certify a copy thereof and file the same with the clerk of the court for public inspection at all times. At least ten days before the first primary the county committee shall meet after three days' published notice in a newspaper of general circulation in the county of time and place of meeting and examine the rolls. Any person may complain of errors therein and the county committee, after hearing complaints, shall in a fair and impartial manner correct and purge the rolls, striking off the names of all persons not residing in the club district for which each roll was made up or otherwise improperly enrolled, and adding any names improperly omitted: Provided, No name shall be stricken from any club roll without three days' notice by mail to the address appearing on the club roll to the person whose name is proposed to be dropped from the roll to show cause why said name should not be dropped.

When said rolls have been revised and corrected by the said county committee they shall be certified to and returned to the respective secretaries of each club and shall thereupon become the official club rolls and no names shall be added thereafter except by the order of a judge of competent jurisdiction.

Upon the completion of said revision the county chairman shall immediately file in the office of the clerk of court a list duly certified by him of all names added or dropped from said roll, with age, place of residence, and occupation, which list shall be preserved by the clerk along with the duplicate roll on file in his office and any person may there inspect said roll and list of corrections at all times.

The original roll shall be returned to the secretary of each club and by him delivered to the managers of the primary election before the hour of opening the polls; and no person shall be allowed to vote at said election whose name does not appear on said original roll as herein required. The managers of election shall return said rolls to the secretary of the club immediately after the counting of the votes and the declaration of the result or as soon thereafter as practicable. If the original roll be lost or miscarried a copy of the duplicate, as corrected by the county committee and filed in the clerk's office, such copy to be certified by him, shall be used in place of the original.

Cloudburst.

Telluride, Col., July 27.—Two women were drowned, fifty families were rendered homeless and a hundred buildings were partially wrecked late today when a wall of water ten feet high, originating in a cloudburst, descended through Cornet Canon, broke through the dam and flooded the town. The damage is estimated at \$150,000.

SALVATION ARMY TO ENTERTAIN THE POOR

PLANNING BIG NIGHT FOR AUGUST 28.

EVERYTHING FREE

People of Anderson, Unable to Afford Night of Pleasure Will Be Given Real Treat

While Anderson's people of means are touring the county, or enjoying the breezes of the sea coast, there are dozens of families in the city without the funds to take such outings and people who cannot afford even a visit to the ice cream parlor or to the moving picture shows. It is these people that Ensign Belcher of the Salvation Army desires to help and he has therefore arranged a very enjoyable night for them next month.

The director of the Anderson branch of this great organization announced yesterday that he is making plans for a big "free" night for the poor people of the city which he will stage on August 28 in the Army hall. At this time the Ensign plans to give cold drinks and ice cream to all those people in attendance and not one cent will be charged.

There will be no charge at the door and the entire affair will be for the poor mothers and poor children of the city, who have never had the opportunity of enjoying a real evening of pleasure. Mr. Belcher announced yesterday that the affair will take place on the evening of the 28th, and he hopes that every family in the city, without funds to purchase these luxuries, will come out and share in the pleasures of the evening.

He also stated that the program for the evening would consist of songs and recitations and there will be no lack of entertainment. Of course, in arranging for an event of this kind, the Salvation Army will find that its finances are hampered, and for that reason it benevoles the people of Anderson to come by its assistance in as large a measure as possible. The Army has undertaken to carry this thing through and will do so, nevertheless, they will need some assistance and they are relying upon the public to furnish this. Almost any business man around town can contribute 50 cents or \$1.00 toward helping the poor people to have one night of pleasure and if each of them will do this much it will be a night that the poor people will never forget.

ELKS WILL HOLD A BIG RECEPTION

Ladies of Anderson to Take Part in Event Which Has Been Arranged Night of August 6

With the exception of the opening ball, which was held during the State Convention, the beautiful new home of Anderson lodge No. 1205, Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, has never been opened to the ladies of the city and the "Hello Bills" have therefore decided that it is high time such a state of affairs is remedied. A committee was therefore appointed at a recent meeting of the lodge to arrange for an opening reception and this committee announced last night that the arrangements for the event had all been completed and that the formal reception, opening the place to the ladies of the city, would be held at the Elks home on the night of August 6. The reception will begin at 9 o'clock.

In planning the new home the Anderson Elks went to some expense to have the place fitted up so that the ladies would feel at home and among the other parts of the building a handsome reception room, built solely for use of the ladies, and a cozy little card and committee room on the top floor. It has just been completed at a cost of slightly over \$10,000.

FIRST DAY'S SESSION OF SALUDA MEETING

BAPTISTS HAVE RALLIED AT IVA

MANY ATTENDING

Biggest Part of Crowd Will Not Arrive Until Today For Saluda Baptist Association

With about 100 delegates in attendance the annual meeting of the Saluda Baptist association opened yesterday morning at Iva. This number will be considerably increased by the hour for the opening exercises this morning and it is very probable that there will be several hundred in attendance by noon today.

Yesterday's meeting was called to order by the following officers in the chairs: Rev. D. W. Hyatt, moderator; Rev. W. W. Leathers, clerk.

The opening services were preached by Rev. R. H. Burris and this was easily the event of the day. Mr. Burris' effort was a splendid one and he made a great impression.

In a few well chosen words Rev. D. W. Hyatt announced that he must give up the gavel as moderator and asked for nominations. One speaker stated that a layman could fill the office, according to the constitution of the association, and he nominated Mr. John E. Bressale.
