The Italian government is prepared to meet any eventualities. About 100,000 soldiers are under arms, including those who can be withdrawn from Tripoli and other places. Just before the Austro-Serbian outbreak 100,000 reservists had been called by the emperor.

PLENTY OF WHEAT FOR EXPORT TRADE

Government Will Have To Provide Law to Register Foreign Ships in Order to Move Crop

(By Associated Press) Chicago, August 1.—News that Germany had declared war on Russia was received with eager interest tonight by leaders on the Chicago board of trade, but in no case with any show of excitement. It was virtually the unanimous opinion that the consequence so far as the wheat market was concerned had been to a great extent discounted in advance.

Fifty million bushels of wheat were said to be already under contract for shipment to Europe and unable to get away from the United States ports. Even with immediate amendment of navigation laws, it was declared that an adequate outlet still would be lacking as shipments would have to be confined as far as possible to neutral ports such as Amsterdam and Rotterdam, or run the risk of delay and loss by blockades.

George E. Marcy, president of the Armour Grain Company, said: "The declaration of war between Germany and Russia will not in my opinion have a great effect on the wheat market though possibly at the opening there may be some flurry one way or the other."

"The present war between these two countries is not a bullish argument because there are large quantities of wheat at the seaboard, and moving to the seaboard from country elevators and farms, and under present conditions very little of this wheat can be safely loaded. Therefore, our export business will be at a standstill temporarily until things are more settled."

"It is to be hoped that the United States government will move as promptly as possible to provide laws under which some of the foreign vessels may be registered as United States bottoms. The United States had this year upwards of 300,000,000 bushels of wheat which can be spared for export."

President C. H. Canby, of the Chicago board of trade, said: "Germany's declaration of war is absolutely imperative for Congress immediately to amend the navigation laws so as to allow foreign vessels to register and sail under the American flag."
