INTERESTING DAY

Various Subjects Pertaining To Farm Life Aply Discussed by Speakers From Clemson

The first of the farmers institutes to be held in Anderson county this year took place last Saturday at Three and Twenty, when the people of that section heard some splendid addresses. Every person at the institute expressed himself as well pleased with what he had learned and it is safe to say that this will be true of all the remaining institutes.

The first speaker to address the farmers gathered Saturday was F. C. Hare of Clemson College who spoke on the subject of "Poultry." Mr. Hare told the farmers many things about this undertaking concerning which they had been ignorant.

"Animal Husbandry" was the subject discussed by R. L. Shields of Clemson College, and he too pleased his hearers.

Miss Caroline Bostick of Winthrop College, delivered a short address on "Home Problems" and the ladies gathered for the day said that this one event was easily worth the whole day.

J. W. Rothrock, agricultural agent for Anderson county, was the last speaker. He discussed the subject of agriculture and gave his hearers some interesting side lights on the best methods to be pursued.

The people of the Three and Twenty section say that they were well pleased with the success they had in the undertaking in their section and they wish that more of them could be held. Mr. Rothrock said that he and the people associated with Clemson College were well pleased with the attendance and the interest manifested.

AUTOMOBILE STRUCK BY SPEEDING TRAIN

PEOPLE WELL KNOWN IN ANDERSON

TWO WERE KILLED

Train No. 11 On Southern Railway Struck Automobile In North Carolina Yesterday

Information reached Anderson last night to the effect that L. E. Case and Mr. Davenport, of Spartanburg, both well known in this city, were instantly killed yesterday shortly after 12 o'clock when the automobile in which they were riding was struck by south bound train No. 11 of the Southern Railway near King's Mountain, N. C.

Both Mr. Case and Mr. Davenport were well known in Anderson. Mr. Case has been to Anderson a number of times to tune pianos and it is said that Mr. Davenport had relatives in this city.

According to the story reaching this city, the two men were driving towards King's Mountain and sought to cross the railroad tracks. Evidently they failed to notice the approaching train and the automobile shot up on the tracks squarely in front of the locomotive and received the full force of the train. Both bodies were badly crushed and cut and it is said that death must have been instantaneous for both men.

Here Is the Latest Aeroplane Bomb, A Deadly Weapon of War

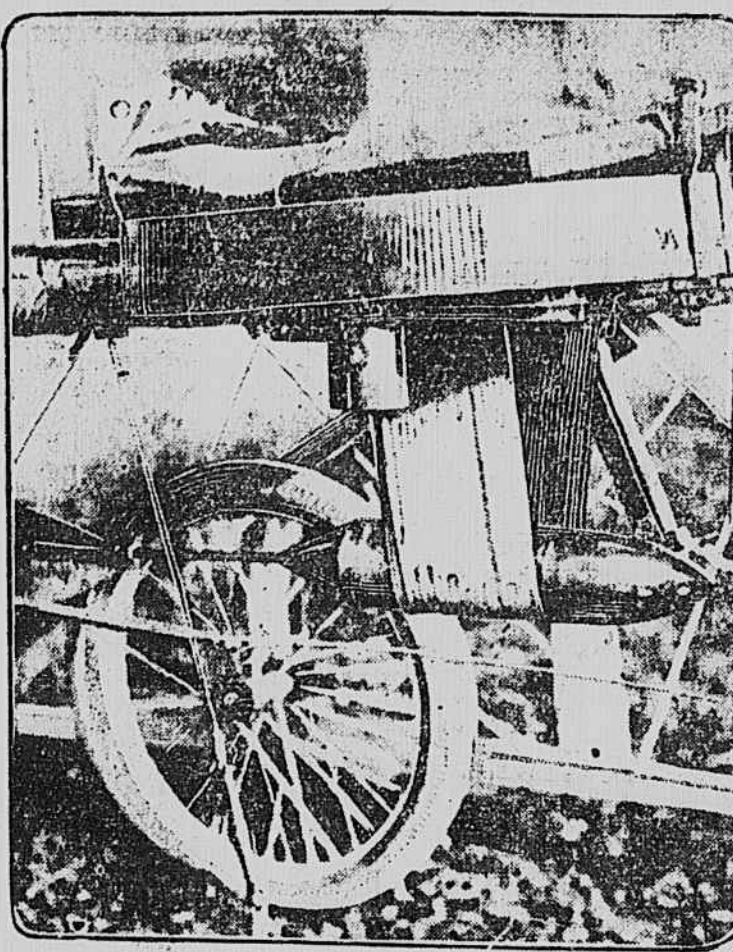

AERIAL warfare has already begun to be a big factor in the European campaign, and France is said to have no less than 200 aeroplanes ready for use against the Germans and the Austrians. The aeroplanes are used for scouting and for bomb dropping. In the illustration is shown the latest form of death dealing instrument. It is an aerial torpedo. It is carried on the lower part of an aeroplane, and when dropped it explodes with terrific force. This instrument is a French invention.

RUNAWAY MULES STRUCK VEHICLE

Mrs. S. M. Pickens Suffered Broken Rib and Other Occupants Hurt in Runaway Sunday

What came near being a serious accident occurred Sunday afternoon when a pair of mules became frightened, ran away and struck another team in which several ladies were riding. Mrs. S. M. Pickens was thrown from the carriage and struck the ground with great force, sustaining a broken rib. The other occupants of the carriage, although badly shaken up and bruised, did not suffer such severe injuries.

Dan Morris, a negro, drove a team of mules out of Cleveland avenue Sunday afternoon and the mules at once became frightened at an automobile, starting to bolt. J. T. Pearson with Mrs. Pearson, Mrs. Trowbridge and Mrs. Pickens, was driving a carriage and when he saw the runaway team approaching he tried to pull to one side, in order to avoid a collision. He was unsuccessful in this and the two vehicles met with great force. It was said yesterday that Mrs. Pickens was doing as well as could be expected and all the other occupants of the carriage have entirely recovered.

PANAMA PAYS

THE PIEDMONT LEAGUE BREATHED ITS LAST

BASEBALL ASSOCIATION HAS FAILED

NO MORE GAMES

Good Ship Sailed Over Stormy Seas But Was Wrecked Before Port Could Be Reached

With not a cloud in the sky, the good ship Piedmont set sail over the professional baseball sea in June only to sink to a grave of failure Saturday. The Piedmont baseball league has breathed its last and from this time on the people of Anderson, Greenville and Spartanburg will have to content themselves with the old corn field variety or back lot baseball. The Piedmont league has done its job and it does not behoove the baseball fans to utter unkind words about the ill-fated vessel.

When the league was launched everyone in this portion of the state thought that the venture might prove to be a success and so it would have been had the fans of three of the towns done their duty. However, Gaffney alone furnished a large enough attendance to even half-way meet the expenses of the teams and Greenville, Spartanburg and Anderson failed to stick to those who had promoted the undertaking.

Two weeks ago Anderson served notice that she could no longer maintain a team and that was the beginning of the end. The other towns stayed on until Saturday at which time Spartanburg sent notice to Gaffney that Manager Martin and President Ramsey of their team had both withdrawn and as a result the league has come to a rather abrupt but not unexpected close.

The Gaffney team and the Anderson team went to Shelby, N. C., yesterday and will play several exhibition games there and it is understood that both these teams may take a barnstorming tour through North Carolina.

The Anderson fans would like to see the boys representing this city go through North Carolina and defeat every town in Tar Heelland.

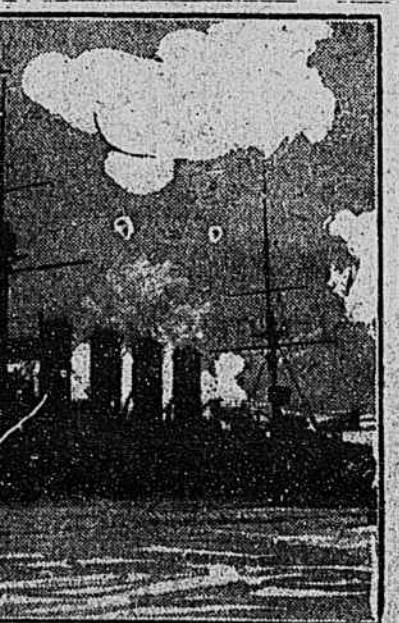

CAMPAIGN DAY SAW BUT LITTLE DISORDER

POLICE HAD FAIRLY QUIET DAY

TWO DIFFICULTIES

One Fight Occurred During Afternoon and Free-for-All Came Near Close of the Day

Notwithstanding the fact that more people were in Anderson yesterday than this city has seen in some time, the police were comparatively quiet so far as the police were concerned. Only two fights arose and one of these was of slight importance while the other was in the nature of a free-for-all. Will Vasez and John Dannister got into an altercation in the basement of the court house and were arrested by the police, both putting up bond and being released. Neither of the combatants suffered any serious injury in this round.

About 6 o'clock the police were attracted to the basement of the court house again and here they found a party of men considerably under the influence of whiskey, according to the statement of the officers. The policemen say that they notified the men that the disturbance must cease and the belligerents all agreed that they would leave town at once if the officers would permit them to do so. They started for Fretwell's stables and the police followed. When the stables were reached, according to the statement of the policemen, all of the men got into a general row and began to use considerable profane language. The officers started for them coming from the street and Foster succeeded in reaching them before they could leave and started to arrest one of the party, whereupon the entire crew took a hand and resisted arrest. They were about to get the best of Gunter and Foster when additional policemen arrived on the scene. It is said that one of the men tried to knife Officer Foster during the melee.

On the police blotter last night the following names appeared charged with being drunk and disorderly and resisting arrest: Josh Moore, John Moore, Furman Ashley and Plummer Ashley. Feaster Ashley was also arrested on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon, although he did not take any active part in the fight.

Sheriff Joe Ashley put up a \$500 bond for all the members of the party and the defendants were released shortly after the fight occurred.
