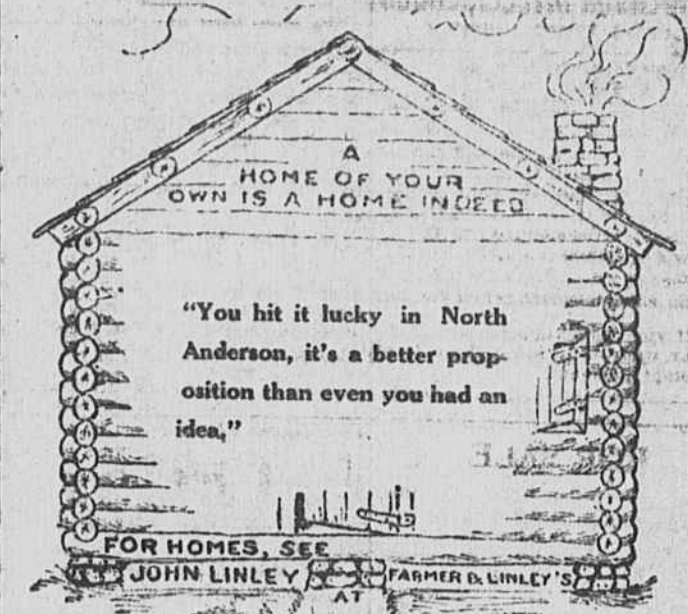
Eight in a Row.
