It is generally conceded that wheat and oats planted between September 15th and September 30th have fifty per cent. better chance of a maximum production than that which is planted later. This is true for the reason in a large measure, that May is usually a dry month and cuts the grain off.

Then again, it is imperative to plant grain crops early, so they can be gotten off earlier in the spring, and a corn and pea crop planted on the same land, thus giving two money crops from the same land in one year.

Polly Geiger, wanted in Anderson for cutting and stabbing Ella Harris in the back last Sunday night while the two were attending services at Wilson Cavalry church, was arrested Tuesday night in Williamston and was brought to Anderson yesterday. She was arraigned in Magistrate Broadwell's court on a charge of disturbing religious worship and drew a sentence of \$25 or 30 days and then she was tried on a charge of assault and battery and she drew a similar sentence in this case. Not having the coin with which to pay her fine, she will be thrown into durance vile, in other words she will spend the next 60 days in jail.

Big Show Is Coming Here.

Announcement has been made that the 101 Ranch, probably the biggest show of its kind in the world, will make only four stops in South Carolina on its trip south this year. The show will visit Spartanburg, Greenville, Anderson and Columbia and will be in the city some time in October. The first advance man has already come to Anderson and he says that this show is the biggest thing of its kind to be seen this year. A number of Anderson people have seen this attraction at one time and another and a number of them remember seeing it when it exhibited at the Jamestown Exposition in 1907.

New Dairy Field Man.

D. W. Watkins, of Anderson county, a graduate of Clemson college of the class of 1909, has just been appointed to a position in the dairy organization of Clemson college under the co-operative arrangement with the United States bureau of animal industry. For the present Mr. Watkins will have charge of the field work incidental to establishing three or more cream routes in the Piedmont section. The object of these routes will be to give farmers living on them a ready market for their cream, which will be handled through a co-operative creamery which Clemson college has just opened.

Employees of that company said yesterday that they were doing more business than they had done since the enterprise was launched in Anderson and that it is almost impossible for them to keep up with their new business.

At the convention was agreed upon. During the day Paul Fuller, who recently conferred with both Villa and Carranza for the Washington government, reported at length to President Wilson and Secretary Bryan. Well informed officials seemed to think the cause of the rupture between Carranza and Villa was Villa's disapproval of Carranza's system of representation for the national convention. Villa was determined his followers should control the convention as he would not participate in it. By the agreement of Carranza, when the first Carranza-Villa break was adjusted, one delegate was to represent every 1,000 men in the army and governors of the state were to be barred. Carranza recently invited the governor and the general as well. Just what the American government would do in the present emergency was not clear tonight. Some officials were confident there would be no second revolution because of the strength of Villa's army. It was not certain whether the United States would interfere its influence or avoid developments.

Rules committee agreed upon a special rule limiting debate on war revenues to seven hours and barring amendments. Adjourned at 4:40 until noon on Thursday. Senate met at 11 a. m. Miscellaneous bills were debated. Began consideration of a bill to create a civil war volunteer officer retired list. Adjourned at 5:25 to noon Thursday.

Herin, Sept. 23—Reports received by the German admiralty show that the destruction yesterday of three British cruisers in the North Sea was accomplished by the German submarine U-9, singlehanded. The German submarine, U-9 was built at Danzig. She is of 300 tons and her armament consists of 3 8-inch torpedo tubes and 3 1-pounder guns. Her speed submerged is 8 knots, and on the surface she can travel at the rate of 13 knots an hour.
