ECHOES OF TROUBLE BETWEEN RACES AT FAIR PLAY SUNDAY

INQUESTS HELD OVER THE THREE NEGROES WHO WERE KILLED

ATTEMPTED TO GET OSCAR BAIRD

Fair Play Citizens Gathered at Westminster to Take Negro From Officer.

Confirmation of the report that three negroes were killed in the riot which broke out at Fair Play last Sunday afternoon and details of an attempt on the part of citizens of this community to take from a Georgia sheriff Julius Marret at Fair Play several days ago, reached Anderson yesterday.

Three Were Killed.
It is an established fact that three negroes were killed in the rioting last

Sunday. One of the negroes, Green Gibson, was killed at Fair Play. Another, supposed to be Gibson's son, was killed at Knox's Bridge, on the South Carolina side while the third one, also reported to be Gibson's son, was killed at Knox's Bridge on the Georgia side.

Inquest Held.
The Georgia authorities held on inquest Monday over the dead body of the negro who was killed on the Georgia side, but result of the inquisition could not be learned.

Would Take Negro.
It was stated yesterday on good authority that a number of Fair Play citizens went to Westminster last Friday night for the purpose of taking Oscar Bird from a South Carolina officer who had gone to Teococa after this negro, who is charged with having seriously stabbed young Julius Marret several days ago. The Georgia sheriff refused to turn Bird over to the South Carolina officer.

COUNTY PRISONERS TO FARE WELL CHRISTMAS

APPLES, ORANGES AND FRESH MEATS WILL BE GIVEN CONVICTS

ROAD WORK

One Camp in Rock Mills at Present and the Other Near Pendleton.

Those unfortunate souls who will be compelled to spend Christmas as prisoners on the county chargining will not be so unfortunate as one might think, for they will get plenty of good things to eat, and that is something which numbers of people who are not on the chargining will enjoy on this occasion.

County Supervisor J. Mack King stated yesterday that the convict forces will be given two days of rest Christmas, Friday and Saturday. With Sunday following, they will have three days of rest from toll in succession.

A barrel of apples, a box of oranges, fresh meat and other special diet will be furnished each of the two convict camps, Mr. King stated. One of the camps is now situated in Rock Mills township, while the other is near Pendleton. There are upwards of 100 men on the two gangs.

The convicts in Rock Mill have been engaged in changing routes of several roads where they ascended or descended exceptionally steep or bad hills. The force at Pendleton has been engaged in working out a new road leading from the town out in the direction of the old McGee place.

It is customary with the county authorities to give the chargining forces an especially good dinner on Thanksgiving day and at Christmas. Last Thanksgiving the prisoners were given a feast of chicken and rice, a large number of hens being bought up for the meat course.

Fox Chase

Picture of Col. Roberts' Fox Hunt Will Be Shown Here.

Manager F. M. Burnett of the Paramount theatre announced yesterday that the motion picture of the Col. James T. Roberts' fox hunt will be shown at the Paramount on Saturday and the following Monday. Everyone in Anderson knows about the picture, which was filmed here several weeks ago by an Atlanta producing agency.

The picture is said to be a most excellent one, showing the fox chase in true form. As generally known, the chase was "staged" at Sunset Forest. Mr. J. J. Fretwell's beautiful country home. There are several good views of the fox, with the hounds close in pursuit, dashing horses and beautiful women and handsome men.

IMPROVEMENTS BEING MADE AT CITY HALL

GUARDHOUSE ACCOMMODATIONS ARE TO BE ENLARGED VERY SOON

OTHER CHANGES

Offices for Policemen Are Rearranged at the Present.

Improvements of an extensive nature are under way in the police quarters at the city hall, and in the near future work of enlarging the guard house accommodations will begin. The improvements and alterations will greatly improve the facilities of the police quarters and guard house, and will bring changes which have long been needed and desired.

The rooms which are used by the police are undergoing considerable alterations. The front room where the officers' lockers were situated and which was used by the men off duty has had a new floor put down, and workmen are now constructing a high desk across the room, much like that which divides the room in which the city clerk and treasurer has his quarters. This desk will separate the room into halves. The general public will be admitted to the outer portion, or lobby, of the room when they have business to transact with the police department. The portion of the room behind the counter or desk will be private. The office to the rear of this room will be the chief's private office, and will, of course, be private.

The guardhouse accommodations are to be enlarged by utilizing the brick stables which were built in connection with the city hall. These are to be thoroughly cleaned and a concrete floor put down. Steel racks will be purchased and installed in the room, and this will be used as quarters for white prisoners. The old guard house will then be devoted exclusively to the accommodation of negro prisoners.

New Editor

Of the Southern Christian Advocate Arrives in Anderson.

The Rev. William C. Kirkland, who was elected by the last conference editor of the Southern Christian Advocate, the official organ of the South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, arrived in the city yesterday and spent the greater part of the day getting acquainted with the people of the city. The members of Mr. Kirkland's family were expected last night, and for the present they will be located at Mrs. Adams' on South Main street.

Mr. Kirkland expressed himself as delighted with Anderson. He is a native of Bamberg county. His latest charge in the conference was at Mullins, and he comes from that town to Anderson. He has been a minister of the conference for the past 18 years. The first issue of the Advocate from Anderson will appear about January 7. The paper will be published by The Anderson Daily Intelligencer.

Lynched For Biting Off Chin of Manager

RULEVILLE, Miss., Dec. 22.—Because he bit off the chin of Thomas King, aged 16, manager of the Boynton plantation near here, Charles Williams, a negro, was lynched by a mob several hours later, according to news brought here today. The attack occurred yesterday, it is said, after King had been involved in a difficulty with a negro named Jones.

ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM LOCAL POSTOFFICE

SERVICE TO BE DOUBLED IN SOME RESPECTS FOR HOLIDAYS

OPEN CHRISTMAS

Postoffice Will Remain Open Friday—Two Deliveries of Mail That Day.

Postmaster John R. Cochran, who, by the way, is about to serve through his seventeenth Christmas in this capacity, yesterday made several important announcements apropos of the usual holiday rush with the mail service. It would be well for the federal public to take heed of these announcements as it might be the means of saving them trouble, and will most certainly save the overworked postal employees a considerable amount of worry and work.

First, the postmaster requests patrons to answer promptly the whistle calls of the carriers. The carriers are overloaded with mail, and especially parcel post matter, at this time of the year and they have to keep constantly moving in order to make their rounds. By patrons answering promptly the whistles of the carriers they will save the carriers much loss of time.

Double Team Service.
Mr. Cochran announced also that Capt. John R. Anderson, superintendent of the Blue Ridge Railroad, had agreed to put on a double team between the postoffice and the depot, beginning with today. This is done to facilitate the handling of mail matter that is dispatched from this office as well as that coming into the office.

Double teams will also be put on the city delivery routes, it was announced, as the mail is the heaviest ever. This should greatly facilitate the delivery of mail to patrons in the city.

Christmas Hours.
Postmaster Cochran announced also that in accordance with the usual custom, the postoffice will remain open on Christmas day, and the city carriers will make two complete deliveries of mail.
