### ASK CHANGE IN OPENING DATE FOR NEW THEATRE

DIRECTORS REQUEST LESSEES TO OPEN PLAYHOUSE ON FEB. 20.

INSTEAD FEB. 9

Also Request That First Night Attraction Be Changed to "A Prince of Tonight."

At a meeting Saturday morning of directors of the Anderson Development company it was decided to request the Bleich Amusement company, lessees of the new Anderson Theatre, to defer the opening of the opera house from February 9, the date previously set, to Saturday evening, February 20.

The directors also decided to request the lessees of the theatre to open the new playhouse with a different attraction from that already announced for the opening night. It has been announced already that the Bleich Amusement company had closed a contract for the presentation here on February 20 of "A Prince of Tonight" and that on the opening night, February 9, the Biston English Opera company would present Verdi's masterpiece "Il Trovatore." The lessees will be requested to open the theatre with the attraction scheduled for February 20, that is, "A Prince of Tonight." Whether "Il Trovatore" will be cancelled entirely or given here at some other date, is a matter that will be decided by the lessees of the theatre.

Can't Get Ready.

After noting the status of work on

the new theatre building, the directors decided that it would be best to ask the lessees to defer the opening of the playhouse until February 20. While it is believed that the theatre could be gotten ready for the opening on February 9, the directors were afraid that the contractors would have to rush the work too much. By postponing the opening for eleven days, they think that much better work can be done in finishing up the interior of the theatre.

Putting in Plaster Work.

Just at present the contractors are engaged in placing the ornamental plaster work in the interior of the theatre in position. The ornamental work is manufactured elsewhere and shipped here crated in straw. It is taken out here and placed in position about the interior of the theatre.

When finished the theatre will be by far the handsomest playhouse in the State. This plaster work is of elegant design and is used in profusion. The decorations about the front of the stage, over the boxes, about the balcony and on the overhead ceiling are exquisite.

### ASK MUSIC FESTIVAL COME AFTER MARCH 1

CENTRAL COMMITTEE WANT CHANGE IN DATE OF ENTERTAINMENT

CAN'T GET READY

Date Agreed Upon Already Would Conflict With Opening of the New Theatre.

Requesting that the date for holding the winter music festival in Anderson be changed from February 20-22-23 to some time after March 1, a telegram was sent yesterday morning by Capt. William Laughlin of the central committee having this matter in charge to the Chicago offices of the company which has been engaged for the performances. The committee expects to hear from the company within a few days with reference to what time in March will suit best for the appearance of their artists in this city.

When it was found out that the directors of the Anderson Development Company would request the Bleich Amusement Company, lessees of the theatre now in process of erection, to postpone the opening date from February 9 to 20, the central committee realized that it would not be possible to have the music festival here at the time originally agreed upon, February 20-22-23, as the first named date is the one selected for the opening of the theatre.

### JOHN W. LINDLEY NEW TRUSTEE CITY BOARD

ELECTED YESTERDAY BY BOARD TO SUCCEED J. L. SHERARD

SERVES UNTIL 1920

Matters of a Routine Nature Considered by Board After Election.

John W. Lindsey was elected a trustee of the city school of Anderson at a meeting of the board yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Lindsey succeeds J. L. Sherard, who some time ago tendered his resignation in view of the fact that he had been elected to the state senate and the law prohibits one man holding two public offices of profit or honor at the same time. Mr. Lindsey was elected to fill out the unexpired term of Mr. Sherard, which will end in January 1920.

There were several matters of routine nature before trustees, who met in regular monthly session, but the election of Mr. Lindsey as a trustee was the only business of general public interest transpiring.

Under the head of routine business the matter of the water bill for 1913-1914, which has been under consideration for some months, was taken up. The trustees held a conference with representatives of the water company Saturday morning on this matter, but at the meeting yesterday afternoon no settlement in the case was reached.

The board of trustees of Anderson school district No. 17, which embraces all the schools in the city and those in the suburbs, consists of the following, their names being mentioned in the order in which their terms expire. J. D. Rast, R. E. Ligon, G. N. C. Boltman, term expiring in 1916; J. A. Brock, Dr. J. P. Duggett and J. M. Sedgett, terms expiring in 1918; W. H. Shearer, W. P. Wright and John W. Lindley, terms expiring in 1920.

### RELIEF ASSOCIATION PLANS TO ASSIST THE UNEMPLOYED

FOR PRESENT APPLICATION FOR WORK CAN BE FILED AT CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Y. M. C. A. BUILDING FOR SUPPLY DEPOT

Meeting Monday Night of Board of Governors for Purpose of Perfecting Plans.

The board of governors of the Anderson Relief Association will meet Monday evening at 7 o'clock in the office of President G. Cullen Sullivan for the purpose of perfecting a working basis for the organization. All members of the board are urged to be present at this conference.

At this meeting the governors will divide the city into 12 convenient districts for convenience in carrying on the work of relieving cases of distress. A chairman will be appointed from each district, who will have in charge the work of relief in a district. The governors will also consider the matter of selecting an executive officer

or general manager for the organization.

A General Manager. The general manager will have in charge the matter of directing the work of the organization. It is planned to give him two or three capable assistants.

The president of the Y. M. C. A. stated yesterday that the association building, on West Earle street, would be tendered to the Anderson Relief Association as a depot for supplies until suitable headquarters for the organization could be arranged.

The Unemployed. The association will also take up the matter of securing employment for those out of work. Persons who have work which they can give someone are requested to notify the Chamber of Commerce for the present, and those who are out of work and desire employment are requested to do likewise. Until the general manager is elected for the organization and has secured headquarters of his own, where this matter will be looked after, the chamber of commerce will take charge of this matter.
