Negro Brought From Georgia.

Charged with having fraudulently obtained \$46 from J. R. Chamblee of this county some years ago, a negro by the name of Sam Rice was brought back here yesterday morning from Clarksville, Ga., by Deputy James Williams. The negro had spent some two years in prison in Georgia, it is stated. It is said that he was arrested there for carrying a pistol and lay in prison for a year awaiting trial. Upon his conviction he was sentenced to serve one year on the chain gang. Deputy Williams left Anderson Friday morning to bring the negro back here.

Bound Over on Grave Charge.

That Verge Hunter, the negro was placed in jail recently on charges of having stolen 2 1-2 bushels of peas from R. W. Parker, a farmer living 7 miles southeast of the city, had broken into a barn to commit the alleged theft, are the charges made against the negro when the case was brought before Magistrate Broadway yesterday. This case being out of the jurisdiction of the magistrate, the negro was bound over to the court of General Sessions for trial.

Special Meeting County Board.

A special meeting of the board of education was held yesterday in the office of County Superintendent of Education J. B. Felton. Mr. Felton stated that there was nothing to give out for publication as to what transpired at the meeting.

Cotton Brought 8 1-4 Cents Here.

Cotton was quoted on the local market yesterday at 8 1-4 cents, though comparatively little of the staple was offered for sale. Late in the afternoon the market dropped to 3 cents. Local buyers stated that they had heard of no point in this section of the country where cotton sold any higher.

First Commission From Governor Manning.

The first commission issued by Governor Manning to be recorded in Anderson county was the commission of Capt. H. H. Watkins as a notary public. The paper was filed in the office of Clerk of Court James N. Pearson yesterday morning and recorded.

Old City Barn Is Coming Down.

Workmen have about completed the task of tearing down the old barn, which was sold at auction a few days ago. The raising of the structure makes a great improvement in the appearance of that section of the city. When the old barn has been removed the city's stable lot will be improved and put in a strictly sanitary condition.

Would be Admitted To the Bar at 18.

Senator J. L. Sherard has introduced in the senate a resolution to admit G. A. L. Rosenberg, the 18 year old son of Mr. H. H. Rosenberg, of this city, to the State bar, upon his passage of the required bar examination. As the law stands now applicants for admission to the bar must be 21 years of age. Young Mr. Rosenberg has been studying law for the past several years. While employed at Lester & Co., some years ago he took up the study of law, and applied himself diligently during spare hours. For the past two years he has been connected with the law offices of Green and Earle. He is an exceptionally bright young man, and his friends predict for him a brilliant future.

Theatre Architect Will Be Here.

A letter received here yesterday at the chamber of commerce from Charles K. Bryant, architect for the new Anderson theatre, stated that Mr. Bryant would arrange his plans so that he could be here for the opening of the playhouse, which has been set for the night of February 18.

Condition of Mr. Maret Critical.

News reaching the city yesterday from Fair Play was to the effect that Julius Maret, who was stabbed several weeks ago by a negro named Oscar Bird, whom he was attempting to arrest, was in a critical condition, a change for the worse having set in several days ago.

Numerous Orders For Maps Received.

Following the appearance of a paragraph in The Intelligencer Saturday morning stating that Secretary Porter A. Whaley of the Chamber of Commerce was anxious to receive all orders for rural maps of Anderson county, so that he might send off the order to the government at once, almost a score of requests for the maps were received within a very short time. Mr. Whaley stated that he will send off the order for the maps early Monday morning.

Senator J. L. Sherard and Samuel M. Wolfe, member of the House of Representatives, are spending the week-end in the city. Senator Sherard stated yesterday that the bill ratifying the assessing abutting property owners amendment was introduced in the Senate on Thursday and that the bill outlining the abutting property law was introduced in the Senate Friday. The bill providing for the appointment of commissioners for Anderson county has also been introduced and will be ratified some time this week. The bills affecting the abutting property owners matter should be ratified, Senator Sherard said, in the next few days.

Mrs. Anna Dean Died Saturday.

Mrs. Anna Dean, of the Toney Creek section of the county died yesterday morning at 9 o'clock of pneumonia. She was about 67 years of age and was the widow of the late Major John T. Dean, and daughter of the late John Poore. She is survived by one son, John T. Dean. The funeral services will be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock at Shady Grove church.
