STAY AWAY FROM THEIR LOOMS RATHER THAN WORK FOR LESS

Several Weavers in Equinox Mill Did Not Go to Work Yesterday Morning When Reduction Became Effective.

Notice having been posted a week in advance by the management of the Equinox Mill that effective Monday morning, January 25, the wages of the weavers would be reduced, a number of the employees of that department failed to report for work when the mill started yesterday morning. In the day, it was reported, several of the "striking" operators returned to work.

Exaggerated and conflicting reports were incirculation on the streets with reference to the matter, some of the reports having it that all employees of the mill had walked out and the plant had been shut down. Other reports had it that the entire force in the weave shop had gone out and this department of the mill was at a standstill. In order that both sides to the controversy might have the privilege of stating their side of the case, statements were gotten from the management of the mill and from the operators who had declined to return to their looms.

Authorities and the employees who had not returned to work and everything that done was done with the best of feeling.

Residents of the Equinox mill village who were conversant with the facts of the case stated that there were about 104 weavers in the mill and that about 30 of these had not returned to work after notice of the reduction in wages went into effect. These 104 persons operated 338 looms, and it was stated, not more than 115 of these machines were in operation yesterday. It was also reported that the cut in wages will average a reduction of about 12 per cent in the pay of an operative.
