OLD LEE HOUSE WAS DESTROYED BY FIRE

WILL EDWARDS, TENANT, LOST HOUSEHOLD EF. **FECTS ENTIRELY**

WAS INSURED

House Valued at \$2,000-Was Insured For \$1,000-Mr. Edwards Carried Insurance.

Fire of an unknown origin yesterday afternoon at 6 o'clock completely destroyed dwelling No. 404 Bleckley street, commonly known as the old Lee house, where the late W. S. Lee, Le house, where the late W. S. Lee, father of D. S. Lee of the Southern Public Utilities Gompany and allied interests, and his family lived for a number of years. The house was valued at about \$2,000 and was insured for \$1,000 with the Fealty Trust Company. The dwelling was occupied by Will Edwards, a carpenter and formerly street overseer for the city, who lost practically all his household effects, valued at \$750 and insured for a comparatively small amount. The house was owned by W. S. Lée of Charlotte.

Members of the family were aware of the fire when flames burst through the ceiling and into the living room, where they were seated. It was evident that the fire originated between dent that the fire originated between the overhead ceiling of the first story and the floor of the second story. The occupants of the dwelling were taken so completely by surprise that they barely had time to escape from the burning building building. Only a pieces of furniture were gotten out of the building by neighbors who were quick to arrive at the scene of the fire.

Immediately upon receipt of the alarm at re department headquarters all equipment of the station was called out. The automobile hose wagon was the first to get away, but was followed closely by the horse-drawn wagon and the hook and ladder wason. The various vehicles made good

passing Earle street, going up North
Main street, they were greatly handicapped by the deep mud. The
auto hose wagon was brought to a
stop upon striking the mud, but after
a short delay was started again. The
horse drawn vehicles were, of course,
greatly hindered by the mud.

When the fire department reached
the scene of the fire the dwelling
was aveloped in fames. The auto
truck stretched 750 feet of hose and
the horse-drawn wagon put out 550
feet of hose, these two streams being
all that were brought into play. The
water did good work, but the flame's
had gotten such a long start they
were unable to save the structure. Bei
ing an old, two story dwelling and
entirely of wood construction, the
flames licked it up readily.
