THIRTY-SEVEN CASES HERE DISPOSED OF DURING 5 DAYS SESSION

13 CONVICTIONS; ACQUITTALS 11

Four Cases Were Continued and Nine Nolle Prossed—Record of Cases.

The shortest sentence received by any one was 20 days.

Record of Cases.

Following is a record of the cases disposed of at the term of the general sessions just adjourned.

Lawrence Hammond, assault and battery with intent to kill, pleaded guilty and received sentence of 2 months.

Albert Thompson and Joe Bates, housebreaking and larceny, pleaded guilty and received sentence of one year each.

J. T. Parks, larceny of live stock, pleaded guilty and received sentence of 18 months.

Maud Scales, larceny, pleaded guilty and received sentence of 2 months.

Lester Lark and Fred Pringleton, housebreaking and larceny, pleaded guilty and received sentence of 10 months each.

Plummer Turner, housebreaking, pleaded guilty and received sentence of 9 months.

Verge Hunter, housebreaking and larceny, pleaded guilty and received sentence of 10 months.

George Keller, disposing of property under lien, pleaded guilty and received sentence of 15 months.

Steve Robinson, burglary and larceny, convicted by jury and sentenced to 18 months imprisonment.

J. F. Kennedy, assault and battery with intent to kill, convicted by jury and sentenced to serve 5 months or pay a fine of \$100.

D. T. Smith, murder, verdict of not guilty directed by the court.

Eugene Shaw, assault and battery with intent to kill, acquitted by jury.

Albert Lewis, violation of the dispensary law, acquitted by jury.

Albert Lewis, violation of the dispensary law, convicted by jury, and sealed sentence left.

Henry Sims, housebreaking, pleaded guilty and received sentence of 7 months.

John R. Jenkins, assault and battery with intent to kill, convicted by jury of simple assault and battery and sentenced to 20 days.

E. Truman Welborne, murder, verdict of not guilty directed by court.

Upon the convening of the term of court there were 37 cases on the docket, of which the following disposition has been made: Continued, 4; nolle prossed; 9; acquitted 11; convicted, 13.

Of the 11 instances in which acquittals resulted, verdicts of not guilty were directed in four instances by the presiding judge. The remaining 7 verdicts of not guilty were returned by juries.

Of the 13 cases in which there were convictions, verdicts of guilty were returned by juries in four cases. In the remaining nine cases the defendant entered plea of guilty.

Only One Long Term.

The longest term imposed in sentence upon any defendant tried at this term of the court was 18 years.

NEW AIR BIRDS

Great Britain Constructing Zeppelin Destroyers for Protection Against Air Raids.

(By Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Five Zeppelin destroyers—airships constructed along new lines—are under construction near London for protection against threatened air raids along the British coast, according to Thomas Rutherford MacMocho, president of the Aeronautical Society of America, here today from Liverpool.

He said the destroyers would be faster than Zeppelins, smaller, easier to navigate and would fire aerial torpedoes.

CATTLE IN GREENWOOD

REV. SAM T. CREECH WRITES CHAMBER OF COMMERCE FOR INFORMATION LIKES CLIMATE

Plans for the establishment somewhere in the State of South Carolina of a "payor" age, are being considered by the Rev. Sam T. Creech, of the South Carolina Conference, and it is not unlikely that the institution will be located here.

The chamber of commerce is in receipt of a communication from Mr. Creech in which he states that he has decided to establish a "pay orphanage," where orphan children might be sent and taken care of at a small cost to those interested in them. Mr. Creech states that he thinks it best to establish the orphanage somewhere north of Columbia on account of climatic conditions, and that from what he knows of Anderson this is one of the best spots in the Piedmont section for anyone to live.

Mr. Creech asks in his letter to the chamber of commerce if some sort of proposition can't be made him to establish his institution here. It is likely that the matter will be taken up by the proper authorities and some action taken in regard to the matter.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—Election of officers by the new board of directors brought to a close tonight the annual convention of the chamber of commerce of the United States. Sessions during the past three days had been marked by notable speeches and debates on the country's general business situation, with particular reference to the effect of the European war on foreign trade.

John H. Fahy of Boston was re-elected president and other officers were chosen as follows: Honorary vice presidents, Henry A. Wheeler, Chicago; A. B. Farquhar, York, Pa. Vice presidents, Robert F. Maddox, Atlanta; Henry L. Corbett, Portland, Oregon, (both re-elected). Treasurer, John Joy Edson, Washington, D. C. Chairman of executive committee, R. G. Rhett, Charleston.

FIFTY-TWO INDICTMENTS

Twenty-Six Deputies Charged With Murder in Connection With Shooting of Strikers.

(By Associated Press.)

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Feb. 5.—Fifty-two indictments charging murder were returned today by a grand jury against 26 deputies in connection with the shooting of 19 strikers at Roosevelt, N. J., January 19. One of the men is at large. Of 27 in all, two John H. Nolan and Frank Coyle, were discharged from custody.

Two of the 19 men shot died of their injuries and each of the deputies was indicted in connection with the death of each striker.
