

Council Acted On Numerous Matters

REGULAR MONTHLY SESSION OF CITY FATHERS LAST NIGHT

IMPROVEMENTS

Large Number of Petitions For Street Improvements Were Acted On

In regular monthly session last night city council transacted a considerable amount of business, the most of which was of a routine nature. Among the more important matters considered were plans for the improvement of a considerable number of streets by the laying of curbing, drains and cement sidewalks; the establishment of street lights; the laying of sewer lines representing an expenditure of something like \$15,000; the adoption of an ordinance creating a municipal court committee for the purpose of exercising clemency in police court matters, and the adoption of resolutions providing for Anderson county the idea of a bond issue for rural road paving similar to the one proposed for Greenville and Richland counties, and taking any kind of action that would tend to further such a cause.

Large Appropriation

The first matter to come before council was a request from the Salvation Army for an increase in its annual appropriation from \$250 to \$1000. This matter was left open for the present.

Request for Street Light

A request for a street light at the intersection of Gray and Railroad streets was referred to the committee on water and lights, with instructions to report back to council.

Communication from Board of Health

A communication from the Board of Health calling attention to the condition of the sewer line on Bleckley street was read and considered. City Engineer Sanders advised the purchase of apparatus for cleaning out this and other sewer lines, and was authorized to purchase the same. Another communication from the board with reference to meats being sold in the city contrary to sanitary laws governing the same was referred to Dr. John Major, meat and milk inspector. A communication asking that the surface closets on the Anderson Mill hill be made more accessible for purposes of cleaning them out was referred to the committee on sanitary matters.

Board of Health

As the term of office of A. H. Dagnall as a member of the board of Health expires in the next few days, he asked that he be relieved of further duty in this connection. A resolution to carry the matter over to the next meeting of council and in the meantime ask the board for recommendations as to a successor to Mr. Dagnall was adopted. The matter of electing a city attorney and a city physician was also carried over.

At this juncture City Attorney Sullivan reported on the question of whether the city physician could hold the position of chairman of the board of health at the same time. He stated that he found nothing in the statutes that would prohibit this, as the city physician was no more than a city employee.

Priv Call Firemen

A resolution by Alderman Spearman that the call firemen of the city be paid their salary on February 15 to date was adopted.

At this juncture council adopted an ordinance authorizing and instructing

the mayor to fix licenses where the same has not been covered by the ordinance already adopted.

City Engineer Sanders was authorized to engage a warehouse for the storage of hay and other feedstuffs for the city's stock pending the building of a city barn.

A few other matters of a minor nature were passed upon by the city fathers before adjourning at 9:15 o'clock.

Alderman Tate: To place curbing and drains on Maxwell, Monroe and Brown streets, to widen Maxwell street and pave the west sidewalk.

Alderman Carter: Curb and drain both sides and pave south side of Glenn street from the Glenn street school to the iron foundry; curb and drain both sides of Prevost street and pave one side from Whittier to Linier streets.

Alderman Spearman: Curb and drain south side of Morris street from River to McDuffie street and pave south side from McDuffie to Main street.

Alderman King: To pave, curb and drain Bleckley street from Main street to the Whittier creek crossing, also Clinkscales street from Murray avenue to Fair street from Clinkscales street to Bleckley street.

Alderman Carter: To extend the Bleckley street improvements from Whittier Creek crossing on up to Allison's store.

Alderman Dobbins: Pave, curb and drain east side of Fant street from Whittier to River streets, also curb east side Fant street from Society to Calhoun street.

Alderman Barton: Complete the curbing of Evans street. All of these improvements were authorized and will be carried out in due time.

Sewerage Extension Matter

Alderman Spearman brought up the matter of the city extending its sewer lines along several streets, at an approximate cost of \$15,000, to complete the original Ludlow plan of sewerage. In the absence of certain matter to be submitted by the city engineer, this matter was carried over to the next meeting of council.

Council Approves Idea of Big Bond Issue For Good Roads

Shortly prior to the adjournment of city council last night City Attorney G. Cullen Sullivan stated that Mr. B. O. Ezana had just called him over the telephone and invited his attention to action which had been taken by the legislature delegations of Greenville and Richland counties in introducing bills in the general assembly authorizing these counties to issue one million and one million and a quarter dollars worth of bonds, respectively, for the purpose of improving rural roads.

The matter was discussed at some length in council and a number of the aldermen expressed themselves as anxious to see the Anderson county delegation take some such action. In fact, Alderman King offered a resolution, which was adopted, that council meet in the near future—and after investigating the matter—and take some action to further such a proposition for Anderson county.

Alderman King also offered another resolution, which was adopted, that city council go on record as heartily approving such a bond issue for the improvement of the rural highways in Anderson county. A copy of this resolution will be sent to the Anderson county delegation in the general assembly.
