VISIT THE "SEEING MEXICO" EXPOSITION CAR



Now on Exhibit in Anderson until Saturday Night, near P. & N. Freight depot

Car was loaded by the Madero government, the National Educational Society and National Railways of Old Mexico, but is in charge of Americans. Some exhibits on display in Car are: Aztec Indian idols from the Mexican National Museum; excavations from Pompeii of Mexico; 400 year-old bird; Mexican monkeys, Mexican talking parrot and other tropical birds; handwork of Mexican natives, as drawn work, basketry, blanket weaving, pottery, finger painting; opals, onyx, silver, gold, etc., from Mexican mines. One chunk of silver weighs 400 lbs., value \$250. There are hundreds of museum exhibits such as dressed fleas, in cases; silk worms and raw silk; horned toads; the armadillo or anteater; 275 pound toad, photos of Mexican people and scenery furnished by the Mexican National Railway, valued at \$1,000. There is much school work, as maps, miniature Mexican mud houses, split straw and feather work, etc. in schools. The agricultural, industrial, and mineral products of Old Mexico are entertaining and educational for everyone to see. Open daily 9 a. m. to 10 p. m. Admission 10c. WOULD-BE ALCHEMIST LANDED IN THE COURT

ERNEST MILLER CHARGED WITH MAKING DIMES OF PENNIES

SOME PASSED As the Alleged Offense Was Committed in Country Case Was Dropped.

When the case against Ernest Miller, charged with cheating and swindling, was called yesterday in the recorder's court it was discovered that the alleged offense had been committed outside of the city limits of Anderson and was, therefore, not within the jurisdiction of the recorder. The defendant was, of course, dismissed.

It was rather a smooth trick Miller was charged with having performed. In fact, if he did what it was charged that he did, he comes about as near solving the problem for which ancient alchemists gave their lives as anyone ever existed on this sphere. In short, Miller was charged with changing the baser metals into silver, and by a process involving the manipulation of various acids. The base metal he was charged with turning into silver was one cent pieces, which, if charged, he made into dimes by treating them with some kind of acid that turned the copper the color of silver.

It appeared that a negro passed one of these fake dimes on a Greek and received in exchange two five-cent packages of peanuts. The matter was reported to the police. Later on a negro approached the officer and showed him one of the fake dimes for which he had given a negro two nickels. This led to the arrest of Miller. It was also reported that one of the fake dimes was palmed off a negro working for the People's Furniture company some time ago. Just how many of the so-called dimes are in circulation, no one knows, of course; but it is not improbable that the one who worked the trick fooled the public while the fleecing was good. If the matter comes to the attention of government authorities it is practically certain that the negro will be hauled up for investigation in the federal court. Turning into the money of the government in such a manner as this is a very serious offense.

In discussing the subject with the Journal's idea man, Mr. B. Fleishman stated that he considered the help proposition one of the greatest things in the retail business. He argues that poor salesmen in retail stores throughout a country are, and have been, one of the greatest assets of the mail order houses.

He contends that here a retail store advertises and lugs people into the store and the employes incompetent help to see the people, that the store is direct, boosting the mail order business in that community. He says that his experience has been that incompetent sales people will drive business away from the store regardless of advertising that is done, and if a salesman drives trade away from their store, where is the customer to expect to the mail order house. As Mr. Fleishman says, the change is that the customer leaving the store, because of the incompetency of the salesman will not be given any better elsewhere, so for the case may be, is inclined to buy a money order, or a draft or send a check to a mail order house in some large city and run the risk getting the goods they want.

Fleishman Bros. do considerable advertising to bring people to their store. They often offer bargains, but they see to it that their sales people are competent to cope with their advertising department, and when a salesman on their floor in any department shows himself incompetent, there is just one of two things for him to do, he is either to prove himself or step aside and make room for some one else.

"SEEING MEXICO" CAR

An Exposition Car Loaded With Exhibits From Old Mexico. "Seeing Mexico" is the title of an exhibit car, containing a complete line of the products, resources and modes of life in the new republic of Old Mexico, which is now stationed on P. & N. track near freight depot.

Since its arrival the exposition car has had almost constant stream of visitors, and all say they greatly enjoyed their "trip to Mex. co." The car creates special interest just now when the wires are hot with news of the Mexican war. The photo exhibit in the car is fine. Some of the pictures are very large—in fact said to be the largest ever made. Some are on plate glass, so placed in the windows as to be unusually clear. There are pictures showing recent views of the Mexican national palace, of the president's home at Chapultepec, of the streets of Mexico City, the public buildings, the people, etc. A picture showing a large gathering of Mexican society people at a banquet, is of interest, as ex-President Diaz, De La Bara ex-Ambassador Wilson, etc. are in the group.

However, the photographs are a small part of the exhibit. Of much interest are the Aztec relics of stone, pottery and other relics of ancient Mexico; ores, as gold, silver, copper, etc., one great specimen said to contain \$250 worth of silver. An interesting exhibit is a very fine copy of the original Aztec stone calendar done on onyx. This was originally intended to be a present from the business men of Mexico City to President Diaz. The calendar was not quite finished, however, when Diaz was deposed and it is now a part of the car collection. It was valued at \$500. The agricultural, industrial and other exhibits on the car are too numerous to mention. They are either educational, entertaining or amusing. The car will remain until Saturday night and is open daily from 9 o'clock each morning to ten at night.

The commissioner of this "Seeing Mexico" car is W. H. Ramseur, who is well known in railroad circles of the South, and also has many friends in Anderson. Mr. Ramseur is originally from North Carolina.
