FIRST DAY'S SALE OF TICKETS IS PLEASING

SOMETHING LIKE 200 FOR FIRST NIGHT WERE PLAC-ED YESTERDAY

NO CUT PRICES

In Tickets Will Be Made Before Night of the Opening Date.

Approximately 200 tickets, at \$5 a seat, for the opening night of the Anderson theatre were sold yesterday by the committee of the board of directors of the Anderson Development Company which has charge of the sale of tickets for the first night performance.

The chairman of the committee announced yesterday that the people of Anderson are asked to pay this price for the first night tickets out of patriotism. No tickets for the opening night show will be sold for less than \$5 prior to the day of the opening of the theatre. Seats will be sold on the night of the first show at a cheaper rate.

The committee feels very much encouraged over the result of the first day's sales, and, of course, expects to place a great many more tickets between now and the date of the opening of the playhouse.

NO IMPROVEMENT IN THE MAIL SERVICE

For Anderson Possible Unless Schedules Are Changed.

Unless there is a change of schedule on the Blue Ridge railroad so as to bring a train into Anderson earlier than the first train for the day is now arriving, there is no chance of improving the mail service for Anderson, according to Chief Clerk J. A. Metts of the railway mail service, who arrived in Anderson yesterday morning from Greenville to make an investigation of the mail service this city is receiving at present.

Complaints as to the lateness of the first mail for the day in arriving in Anderson was made some time ago through the chamber of commerce. The chamber of commerce had suggested that the government might make arrangement with the Piedmont & Northern interests whereby mail might be brought into the city earlier in this way.

After investigating the matter Mr. Metts stated that were mail brought into the city in the morning by the interurban cars it would arrive here only six minutes ahead of the train that now brings it. The interurban car leaves Greenville at 6:45 o'clock and arrives here at 8:25 o'clock. The train from Seneca which brings the morning mail arrives here at 8:31 o'clock or just six minutes after the interurban train.

Mr. Metts stated in the first place the interurban lines will not haul mail at the present price paid for hauling it, which is 3 cents a mile. This would entail upon the interurban people the expense of providing a messenger to convey the mail to and from the station and the postoffice. The interurban people have been approached upon the matter, but have refused to handle mail at this price.

Before leaving the city yesterday afternoon on his return to Greenville, Mr. Metts took occasion to speak in very complimentary terms of the work of Mr. John R. Cochran, who is to retire soon as postmaster. "The man who gets the job of postmaster here," said Mr. Metts, "will sit down in a soft seat. I mean by that he will take hold of a machine that is well oiled and running smooth. There is not a more efficient postmaster in the South than Mr. Cochran, and he has an organization on this floor that is unexcelled by that in any postoffice of the country. He has a wonderful executive ability and this has been used in perfecting an organization in this post office that is about as perfect as one could be. Mr. Cochran has been of great help to the postal authorities in the matter of readjusting its mail service so as to fit changes in schedules. He has always secured advance information relative to such matters and sent it to us in ample time to allow us to make the necessary adjustments without inconvenience to the service. During Mr. Cochran's long administration he has never made a recommendation to the department for improvement in the service but what it was approved and carried out."

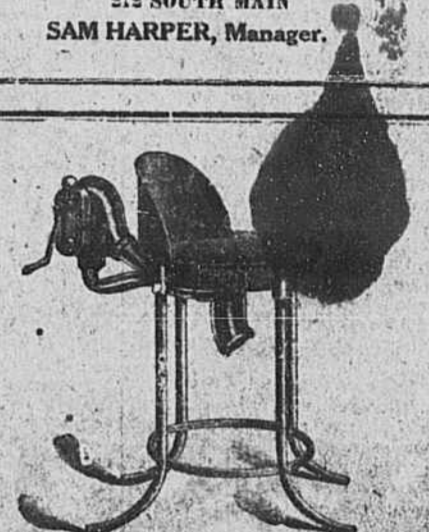

LARGER COUNTY BOARD FUND THAN ANTICIPATED IN SIGHT

LIKELY THAT SOMETHING LIKE \$7,500 WILL BE AVAILABLE

1-4 MILL LEVY IS NECESSARY

Senator Sherard Writes Supt. Felton Letter of Most Encouraging News.

That a county school board fund of something like \$7,500 will be provided this year for the Anderson County schools, instead of a much smaller sum which was expected, and that to provide this fund the legislative delegation will levy a one-quarter mill special tax instead of twice that amount, which was asked for by County Superintendent of Education J. B. Felton, is the highly gratifying news contained in a letter received yesterday morning by this official from Senator J. L. Sherard.

Some days ago, it will be recalled, the intelligencer spoke of Mr. Felton having conferred with Senator Sherard with reference to the advisability of the delegation levying a special tax this year of one-half mill to provide a school board fund. At the time Mr. Felton took this matter up with Mr. Sherard and urged him to use his influence with the delegation to have such a levy made he had no idea that Anderson County would receive this year any money from the State board fund, since this county last year received about one-tenth of the fund of \$45,000 set aside by the legislature for

this purpose. Senator Sherard writes that State Superintendent of Education J. E. Swearingen tells him he sees no reason why Anderson County should not come in this year for as large a share of the State board fund as she received last year.

Fund of \$7,500.
Anderson County received last year from the State board fund something like \$4,200. Senator Sherard writes that the State superintendent knows of no reason why the county should not receive an equal sum this year. Mr. Sherard goes on to state that the delegation had decided on a special levy of one quarter mill for the county board fund, which is just half the amount of the levy asked by Mr. Felton before he knew that there was any possibility of the county receiving this year anything from the State board fund. Mr. Felton stated yesterday that a special levy of one-quarter mill will bring in something like \$3,300. Adding to this amount the sum of \$4,200—which is the amount secured last year from the State board fund and which will probably be secured this year—it will be seen that the Anderson County board will be provided with a school board fund of \$7,500.

Senator Sherard's Letter.
The letter to Senator Sherard to Mr. Felton is as follows:

Columbia, S. C., February 9, 1915.
Mr. J. B. Felton, Anderson, S. C.
Dear Mr. Felton: Our delegation met this afternoon for the purpose of revising our county supply bill, and we have provided an extra school tax of one-fourth of a mill, as you will observe from reading the enclosed draft.

I had a talk with Mr. Swearingen before our meeting, and there is every prospect that you will be able to get as much for the appropriation for the support of needy schools as you succeeded in getting in 1914. Out of the \$45,000 appropriated you secured for Anderson County approximately \$4,200, or nearly one-tenth of the entire fund. This was a splendid showing and a record very much to your credit. Now, if you succeed as well in 1915 as you did last year—and I am told by Mr. Swearingen that there is no reason why you should not—you will be able to get about \$4,000 and in addition the sum derived from the levy we have given you, which will provide a total of a little more than seven thousand dollars.

I have framed this special levy in the supply bill so that the money derived from it can be expended under the direction of the county board of education. I want them to have sufficient latitude in the distribution of this fund to use it where it is most needed. I am willing to leave it to their good judgment.

This may not be all that you would like to have, but it is at least a step forward and will give to the county more funds than it has enjoyed heretofore. During my term of four years in the service of the county and State I hope to contribute some small part to the building up of the public schools, and I can assure you always of my hearty sympathy and cooperation in all that you may do for the improvement of the schools in Anderson County.

WORKING BOTH NIGHT AND DAY ON THEATRE

PAINTERS PUTTING FINISHING TOUCHES ON THE NEW PLAYHOUSE

MOVIE MACHINES

Have Arrived and Service Will Begin Saturday 20th—Orchestra Music.

Painters are now working night and day on "The Anderson" theatre in their efforts to have all work of this nature about the new playhouse completed in time for the formal opening on the evening of Friday, February 19th. Work of installing the chairs will be completed today, and the hanging of the scenery will be finished by tomorrow. The steam heating system and the electric lighting features are installed and in operation. With a few more finishing touches, the new amusement place will be completed down to the smallest detail.

The two large motion picture machines for the theatre arrived yesterday. Beginning Saturday, February 20 motion pictures of the highest order will be shown at the theatre on days when there is no regular attraction at the theatre. The machines are of the Powers & A 1915 model. In the showing of pictures a motor generator set will be used. This is an apparatus which changes the alternating electric current to direct current, thereby giving a clearer and a steadier light on the screen. The management of the theatre announced that the General Film Service will be used. The theatre orchestra will render music at the motion picture shows as well as at the regular shows.

OFFICES OVER THEATRE

Drs. Chisolm, Trowbridge and Suggs to Move Office.

Announcement was made yesterday that Drs. Chisolm, Trowbridge and Suggs, dentists, with offices at present in the Blackley building, have leased offices in the new theatre building, and will shortly move into them. These are the first offices in the new building to be let. It is expected that other announcements as to tenants for the new building will be forthcoming in the next few days.
