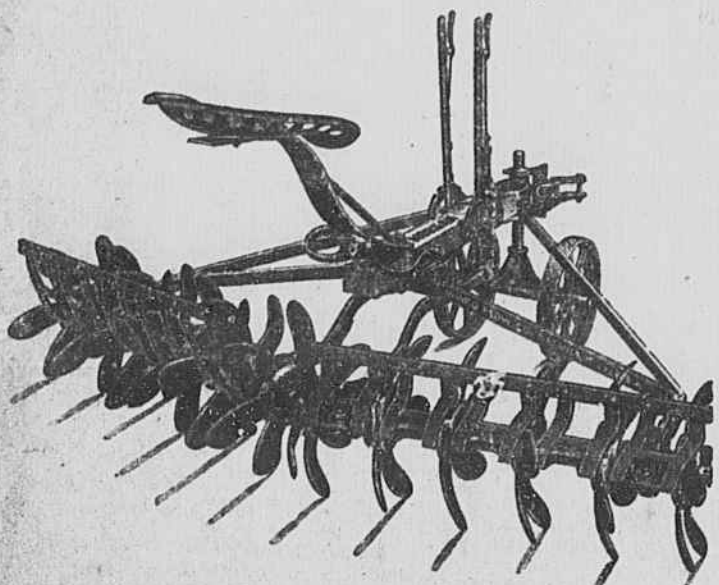

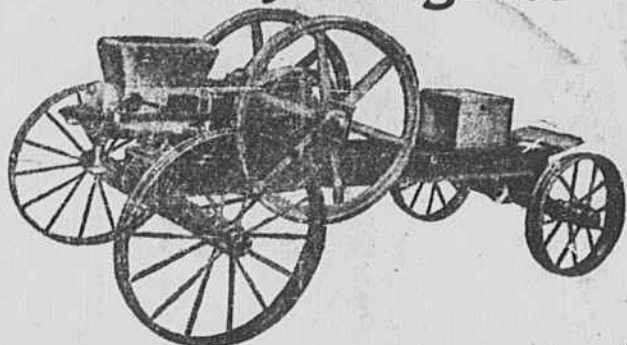
The Morgan Patent Spading Harrow

The frames of all these harrows are made of the best wrought iron and steel, and are arched so that they will easily pass over uneven ground and any ordinary obstructions.

The blades are S-shaped, each being made from one solid piece of spring steel. They cut into and lift the soil to a depth of four to six inches, turning and pulverizing the ground precisely like the hand spade.

For deep and fine cultivation no other harrow equals it; unplowed corn stubble or hard packed soils are made loose and friable to a depth of five to six inches, and if used on light and mellow ground, as shallow work can be done as desired by taking off the weight of the driver and setting the gangs at a slight angle.

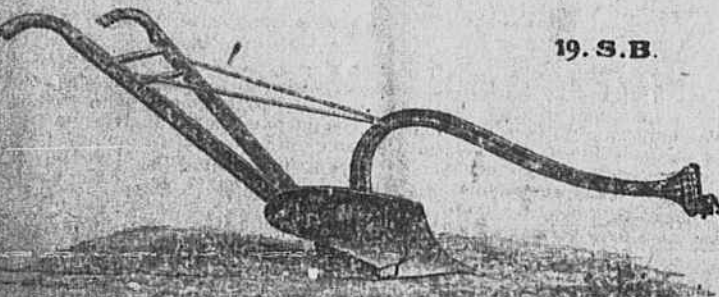

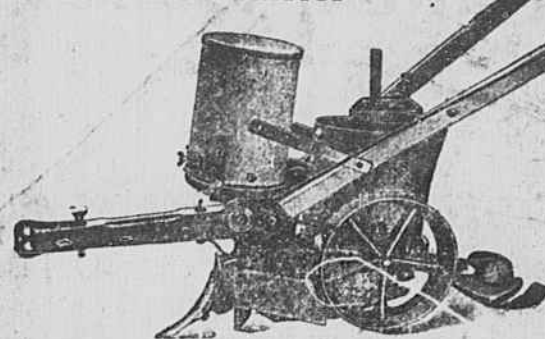

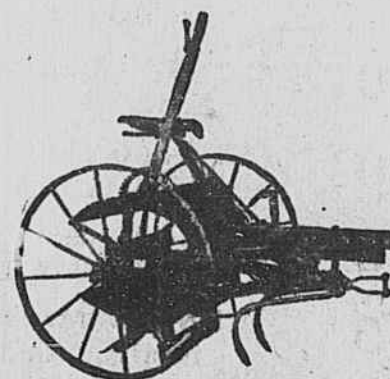

Pressure spring in front of axle prevents neck weight on horses.

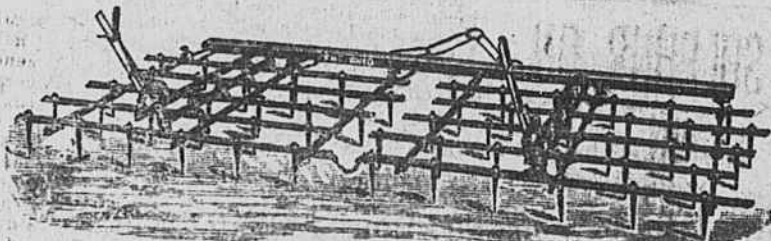
Spring on hitch takes jerk off the team. Spring between pole and frame relieves jar on the driver.

Wheels have staggered spokes and hubs have hard oil caps.

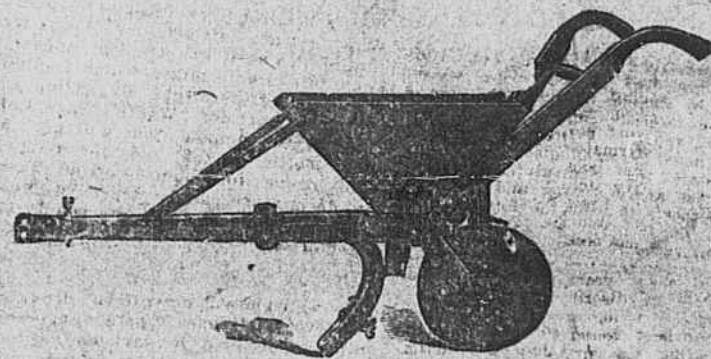

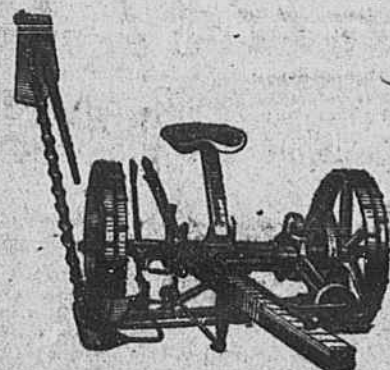

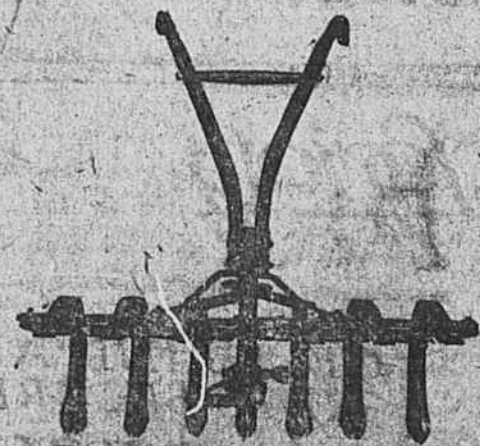


McCormick Vertical Lift Mower
