Summary of Development.

Summary of Development.

The girl.' demonstration work began with the canning clubs in 1910 when four counties in two States were organized. It has grown to an organization of more than 40,0000 girls under the supervision of nearly women agents. Feaults of 1913 400 women agents. Fesults of 1913 show that in the canning clubs of the Southern States, the 4,202 girls who sent in reports canned 1,032,115 cans of tomates; 522,147 cans of other products at a total value of \$180,-420.05. They have also developed to a considerable extent special products of southern fruits and vegetables. Poultry clubs have followed the work in canning and gardening and there are now 2,090 poultry club members. Bread clubs have been organized experimentally in a few counties and some home improvement work has been done. This fall will see winter

some home improvement work has been done. This fall will see winter gerdening extensively carried on by club members. In all of these activities, the women on the farms have given active help. Frequently they have been enrolled to receive the instructions, have attended meetings and demonstrations. 'As cooperators they have eagerly followed the instructions of the county woman agent and have urged that a special work be organized for them.

The cooperative work carried on by the office of farm demonstration work and the State colleges of agriculture, has from the beginning emphasized the plan of organization which provides for the efficient, devoted, county woman agent employed for a long a term as possible and instructed and supervised by the State agent. man agent in every county employed for the entire year. Now that the worth of the work has been established and it has been sufficiently proved that it cannot be successfully done without close supervision all the year round, it is our policy, for the coming year, to get just as many counties on this basis as possible re-gardless of any extension of territory. In those counties, as rapidly as the girls' work shall become well-establighted and the agents efficiency proved, demonstration work for women shall be developed. It is important that this be done as promptly as is consistent with thorough work so that, as funds become available from the Smith-Lever bill for the salaries of women agents, there shall be an ex-irtence of practical well-established irtence of practical well-established system of home demonstration work with tabulated results for enough counties to be convincing as to the soundness and worth of the scheme. Protecting the New Work.

Fifteen or more women of the Mountain Creek section of the county and several in some five or six other school communities have signified their intention of becoming affiliated with the home demonstration work, which Miss Janie C. Garlington, demonstrator in charge of the Girls' Tomato and Canning Club Work, will conduct in connection with her other duties.

The following outline of plans-for the home demonstration work will be of interest to those who have significated their intention of joining the clubs and others who might care to join in: clubs and others who might care to affairs. Her visits of instruction and encouragement has established her place in the affections and confidence of the home. The girls have increas-ed the supply of wholesome food by means of the garden, canning and poultry; they have increased the in-come of the farm home by their sales of products. Many corn club boys have begun the raising of stock. They will furnish choice home cured meats.
The winter garden is yielding the variety of fresh vegetables heretofore lacking in many southern farm

The plans now outlined must be concrete and simple enough for mediate use, yet, must be part of a mediate use, yet, must be part of a continuous and comprehensive scheme which will shortly affect every phase of rural household activity in ways of progress and wholesome living. They must utilize the material development the largest the spirit of comust utilize the material development, the loierest, the apirit of cooperation, from the family and community to the county and State, and the self-help characteristic of all our demonstration work. There must be definite parts of the home demonstration work for the men and boys as well as for the women and girls. The men demonstration agents and college instructors will continue to give vital and generous help. and generous help. First Steps.

(a) Women to be enrolled in home demonstration work.

(b) Under direction of the county woman agent they will participate in and teach their daughters the pre-paration of attractive dishes from canning club, poultry club, and pig club products and those of winter gardens. This will shortly involve demonstrations in other foods, as breads, etc., which should accompany the dishes made in way of forming wholesome combinations.

wholesome combinations.

(c) Accompanying this use of club products, the women will make demonstrations in use of labor saving devices and conveniences, many of which shall be home made. The first one of importance will be a first one of importance will involve both saving labor and improved sanitary conditions of the farm home. Before long this will include home water works systems.

(c) Suggested conveniences to be purchased; labor saving cook stoves, devices for preparation of fruits and vegetables, and cleaning devices. Many conveniences of this kind have already been given as prizes and club members will wish to purchase others

with their garden profits.

(f) The county woman agents will encourage women demonstrators to find and constantly extend to others, the best methods and practices now in use in their communities. By this means good recipes, conveniences, methods of work, already discovered

methods of work, already discovered will become general.

(g) The carrying on of home demonstrations will shortly result in meetings in the homes and schools for purposes of reporting work done and showing results. The need for clubs and social features will be met from time to time as has been done in the strik, work. girls' work.

Instructions will be furnished by means of demonstrations, visits from the county agent, circulars, letters, and bulletins from State colleges and the office of farm demonstration work. These will be furned in definite relation to the con-rete development of the demonstrations.

The exhibits of boys' and girls' groducts will this year be accompanied by exhibits showing the progress of the work outlined above.

"He was by Villa's side at Chihuahua, acted for a time as his confidential agent to the United States and finally accompanied Villa to Mexico City. De Caso was seriously involved in a series of murders and kidnapings committed in Mexico City. His family lived together with Villa's, "Before Gutierrez, De Caco made
