ORDER STRIKERS TO RESUME WORK

Great Britain Says Requirements of the Nation Are Being Endangered by Strike of Shipbuilders

LONDON, Feb. 26 .- (8:41 p. m.)-While conferences were being held to day to settle wage differences between the shipbuilders and ship yard engin-eers, some of whom already are on strike, the government made a dra-matic move in ordering resumption of work Monday and promising that arrangements would be made for the dispute to be referred to a court of arbitration.

The order was signed by Sir George Askwith, chief industrial commissioner, who pointed out that in conse quence of the delay in reaching a setlement the requirements of the nation were being endangered and that he had been instructed by the government that "important munitions of war, urgently required by the navy and the army are being held up by the cessation of work and that they must call for a resumption of work on Monday morning, March 1.

The court of arbitration will have

power to fix the date from which a settlement shall take place.

Had the unrest been allowed to spread, one hundred thousand men would have been involved. The unions had not authorized the strike, but the men already had refused the men already had refused the employ er's offer of a cent and a half an hour wage increase and were about to vote for an official strike.
