Board of Health To Hold Meeting. The city board of health will hold a meeting on the 8th of March for the purpose of transacting such business as may come before it. It is understood that Mr. A. H. Dagnell, who was a member of this board, has tendered his resignation, and the vacancy caused thereby will be filled by an election at this meeting. The members of the board are Mr. F. B. Creighton, Dr. W. H. Hardin, Dr. B. A. Henry, Dr. W. F. Ashmore and Mr. A. H. Dagnell.

Will Visit Schools Next Thursday. Supt. J. B. Felton will visit Oak Hill and Concrete schools Thursday of this week.

Prominent Lecturer Will Be Here Soon. Dr. Meyer-Gerhard, who is touring the South delivering lectures showing the side of Germany in the present European war, is scheduled to deliver an address at Anderson the latter part of this month. The exact date has not yet been decided. Secretary Whaley of the chamber of commerce, in a receipt of a letter from Albert Orth, Charleston, S. C., editor and publisher of the Deutsche-Zeitung, stating that Dr. Meyer-Gerhard will be glad to come to Anderson to deliver one of his noted addresses on the causes of the war. This lecture will be given under the auspices of the educational committee of the Anderson Chamber of Commerce, and is not to be taken as any indication of the attitude of any member of this committee.

The meeting Monday afternoon was led by Mrs. T. Allen, the subject being "Enlightenment and Efficiency." The meetings will be held at 8 o'clock. All women are urged to attend. Those having children are urged to bring them along also, as they will be cared for by Mrs. W. B. King, Jr., who will entertain them in the basement of the church.

Called to Tennessee Account Death of Father. The many friends of Mr. Bond Angerson will regret to learn that he was called to the home of his father at Jackson, Tenn., by a telegram announcing his father's sudden death in Nashville, early yesterday morning. Mr. Anderson was president of the State senate and this body was in session at Nashville. His death was due to heart failure.

Meeting of Board of Assessors. The board of assessors for Anderson county has been called to meet at the court house at 12 o'clock on March 4th, a notice of this meeting, by Aud' or Winston Smith, being published elsewhere in this paper. The time for this meeting was Monday, March 8th, but on account of the fact that court will be in session on that day, Mr. Smith decided to have his board meeting earlier. At this meeting the books will be issued to the members containing the returns as made from each assessor's district. It was understood that a few of the assessors have not yet secured their commission, and it is necessary that this be attended to before the date of this meeting.

Only One-Fourth Have Paid Taxes. City Clerk and Treasurer Scott states that he is not writing as many tax receipts as he would like to be writing at present, in order to avoid the great rush which is bound to occur a few days from now. The time for paying city taxes expires on the 15th of this month, and up to date Treasurer Scott states that he has written only about 25 per cent of the receipts which he will have to write before the tax books close. He states, however, that this is nothing different from what is usually the case, as the tax payers generally put off making their payments until the last few days.

Will Inspect New School House. County Superintendent of Education J. B. Felton will today inspect a new one room school house which has been constructed between Bolton and Honea Path, at a point which is a junction of three school districts, Barker's High Point and Bethany. This point has quite a number of children and the distance is so great to the principal schools in each district that it was decided to erect a joint school house at this point. T. C. McConnell, of Anderson, was the contractor in charge, and a neat one room school building has been erected.

Touring Car Catches Fire. Yesterday afternoon about two o'clock the large touring car of Mr. Joe Day caught on fire in front of Manning & Glenn's store on South Main street. This car caught from burning gasoline being ignited from the engine, but was extinguished before very much damage was done to the car.

Arrested Charged With Breaking Into Store. Preston Hampton and Bill Scott

were lodged in the city jail yesterday, charged with having broken into W. Pruitt's store Tuesday night between 10 and 11 o'clock, these negroes having been apprehended and arrested by Policemen Whitten and Stewart. It seems that the entrance into the store, was effected by Preston Hampton while Bill Scott stood on guard. Scott was the first to be arrested, being caught at Bailey Pool's place two miles north of the city, and his statement was what caused the policemen to arrest Preston Hampton. Mr. Pruitt does not know just what was lost from his store, but it was found that some meat was taken and some small change out of the cash drawer.

Paying Commission In Short Session. Members of the board of city paying commissioners met last night in the office of Chairman E. R. Horton for the purpose of discussing a number of matters of a routine nature. It was announced after the meeting that the session was called at the request of the city attorney, who wished the advice of the commission on certain legal points that will come up later in the process of the bond election.

Name of Bijou To Be Changed. Manager C. H. Bleich of "The Anderson theatre announced yesterday that the Bijou theatre, which he purchased Monday, will be closed indefinitely. When the theatre is reopened Mr. Bleich stated, it will be under a different name, that of "The Garrick." This will doubtless prove of interest to the patrons of the motion picture shows and to the public generally.

New All-Steel Train Ran Off the Track. The new all-steel train of the Blue Ridge Railway met with a mishap yesterday afternoon about a mile west of Pendleton. Spreading rails caused the entire train, with the exception of the front trucks of the locomotive, to go on the ground, or rather on the rock ballast. The line was blocked for a considerable while, but by means of "shuttle trains" between the scene of the wreck and Wall-halla and the scene of the wreck and Anderson passengers were kept moving without loss of time. Three pedestals on one of the new steel coaches were badly cracked, and it is probable that the car will have to go to the repair shop. The track was cleared after a few hours and every thing is again going smoothly on the Blue Ridge.

Bamboo Cane Attracts Attention. A most interesting object which attracted the attention of all passers by today was a bamboo cane brought from his home by Mr. Rufus Fant. It was about three inches in diameter and was 27 feet high. To those who had never seen a bamboo this cane was a revelation. That it reached this size as a result of one summer's growth seems almost incredible. Mr. Fant stated that he had a number of these growing near his home.

Ad Club Meeting Thursday Night. The adjourned meeting of the Anderson Ad Men's Club will be held at the chamber of commerce rooms Thursday night at 8 o'clock, at which time a luncheon will be served, and a permanent organization as a department of the chamber of commerce will be effected. John W. Linley is temporary chairman, having been elected at a recent meeting to take the place of B. O. Evans, resigned. The committees appointed to secure new members, report that they have about fifty new names to submit at the meeting Thursday night. Messrs. Henry Harper and Harry Gelsberg compose one committee, and M. Fleischman and Archie Todd, the other. They have been quite active, and expect to add several new names before the meeting Friday night.

HOLD SECOND DAY'S SESSION

Board of County Commissioners Spent Yesterday Approving Claims and Transacting Routine Business

The Board of County Commissioners met yesterday at 11 o'clock for its second day's session. The morning of the session was spent in the approval of claims and transacting of routine business. Former County Clerk, J. C. Acker, was elected by the board as county attorney, to succeed Hon. Kurtz P. Smith, who has been serving in the capacity of attorney for the board of county commissioners. Mr. Acker has served for several years as clerk of the county board, and is in every way qualified to fill the position of county attorney. His selection is one that will be of general satisfaction.

The matter of the appointment of a janitor for the court house was left by the board of the clerk of court. There was a full attendance at this meeting of the board, which was the first meeting held by the new board of commissioners.

In the Police Court. Recorder Russell had an easy day yesterday, there being only one case to come before him, when police court roster was called yesterday morning. The only offender to appear before his honor on this occasion was Pat Gillan, white, charged with disorderly conduct and loud swearing, which case was dismissed.

Candidates for Trade Commission Named by President Wilson



President Wilson has just sent to the senate the names of five men for members of the new federal trade commission created by act of this congress. It is expected in Washington that there will be a fight in the upper house over the confirmation of several of the nominations. The nominations are as follows: Joseph E. Davies, Democrat, of Wisconsin, now commissioner of corporations; for a term of seven years. Edward N. Hurley, Democrat, of Illinois, president of the Illinois Manufacturers' Association; for six years. William J. Harris, Democrat, of Georgia, now director of the census; for five years. W. H. Parry, Progressive, of Washington, editor; for four years. George H. Rublee, Progressive, formerly practicing lawyer at New York and now resident of Cornish, N. H.; for three years. The law creating the new commission defines its powers relating to commerce in these words: "Commerce means commerce among the several states or with foreign nations or in any territory of the United States or in the District of Columbia, or between any such territory and another, or between any such territory and foreign nations, or between the District of Columbia and any territory or foreign nation." Amplifying the purpose of the commission, regarding the tariff as defined by this section of the law creating it, the president said in his recent speech at Indianapolis: "But if by scientific treatment of the tariff they (the Republicans) mean adjustment to trade conditions of America and the world, then I am with them. And I want to call their attention, for though they voted for it, they apparently have not noticed it, to the fact that the bill which created the new trade commission does that very thing."

Fire in Acid House.

WORURN, Mass., March 2.—Ten thousand gallons of sulphuric acid were released by a fire which destroyed the sulphuric acid house of the Merrimack Chemical Company's plant tonight. A boy who fell into a pool of acid may die. Several houses were disabled by acid burns.
