

PRELIMINARY GIVEN **CORNELIUS GAMBRELI**

CHARGED WITH ASSAULT ING DR. E. H. PARKS SOME WEEKS AGO

OUT ON BOND

Enters Plea of Not Guilty and an Alibi-The Testimony

A preliminary hearing was given yesterday afternoon to Cornellus Gambrell, the negro who was arrested last Saturday night and identified by Dr. E. H. Parks as the person who assaulted him in his store the previous Saturday. Following the preliminary hearing, Gambrell was bound over to the court of general sessions by the presiding magistrate, G. H. Geiger, and was released on ball in the sum of \$500.

Upon arraignment the negro entered a plea of not guilty and an alibi.

Mr. E. H. Parks sworn says: I am certain that this is the negro who struck me at my place of business in the city of Anderson, South Carolina, County of Anderson on the 27th day of February, 1915.

Cross examination by Mr. Rice.
I gave the alar's about one minute after the negro ran out my place of business. I told Mr. Whitten and Mr. Alken that I was not certain that this is the man who struck me, that I wanted to see him again. I am willing to swear that this is the negro who struck me.

If we can prove that this negro was in Belton when you were struck would you still say he is the man who struck you?

Yes. I had seen the negro before he atruck me but did not know where he worked or what his name was.

I go to dinner about one o'clock or

Re direct.

I go to dinner about one o'clock or a little after. I was struck between two and three o'clock in the afternoen. It was about 3 o'clock when the negro ran out of my office or place of business. If you can prove that this negro was in Belton when I was struck I would still say he was the man who siruck. I can't say certain what kind shirt he had on, I thought he had on a white shirt. He had on black hat.

DR. E. H. PARKS.

Asa Watson sworn says:

I was standing before the window
f the business place of Mr. E. H. of the business place of Mr. E. H. Parks on the evening of February 71th, 1915, and saw the detendant run out of Mr. Park's store. This was between 3 and 4 o'clock in the afternoon. I heard Mr. Park say O Lord, and in about one minute saw the negro run out the store. I tried to catch the negro.

I work at the Equinox Mill. I have been in the city about 20 years. I saw the aegro good. He had on a dark gray looking shirt, like he has on now. He had on a red looking necktle. He had on the same suit he has on now. The same hat he has now—a brown hat. I chasod him as far as the ten cents store. I saw him this moraing for the first time since he assaulted Mr. Parks. I identify the salety pin in his collar—he had it in his collar when he ran out of Mr. Park's store. He did not have on a vest. I am certain he is the man who hit Mr. Parks even if you prove he was in Belton, if he has a twin vrother I would still identify him as the negro who struck Mr. Parks. The town clock struck S. when I was coming around the corner at Davis Livery Stable. It was pretty close to 4 o'dock when the negro came out of the store.

Mrs. Clark has decided to purchase five to ten good dairying cows, and become a regular shipper on the Anderson creaniery route. In addition to shipping cresm she will also take advantage of the opportunity to ship eggs. Another acquisition to the patrons of this route will be Mr. A. M. Campbell, who ad a conference also with Mr. Garrison, and states that he expects to make arrangements to dispose of the surplus cream and eggs from his farm, and will also purchase several additional cows. Mr. Campbell has also decided to invest in a cream separator.
