EL PASO, Tex., March 5.—The purpose of General Obregon's contemplated evacuation of Mexico City is to launch a campaign against the Villa forces in the north, according to persons arriving here today. They described conditions in and about the capital as chaotic.

Almost all portable property of value, the refugees said, has been confiscated by Obregon's troops. Small-pox had broken out at Vera Cruz, they said, where the water supply had been cut off. The arrivals said that quantities of arms and ammunition had been received by the Carranza forces from Central and South Agherican countries by way of Havana.

A report here today said Carrange troops had cut the Central Railroad between Chihuahua City and Torreon. General Villa is said to be in the vicinity of Guadalajara.
