COUNCIL TRANSACTS ROUTINE BUSINESS

REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING LAST NIGHT VOID OF SPECIAL FEATURES

CITY PHYSICIAN

Dr. W. F. Ashmore Re-elected for Current Year—Prohibitive License on Carnival

City council met last night in regular monthly session and transacted a considerable amount of business of a routine nature.

When council had opened Mr. C. M. Guest, local contractor and builder, appeared and asked to know how much of the main street he would be allowed to use for piling material in carrying out the contract he holds for making certain improvements in Hotel Chiquola.

Ernest H. Cochran, Esq., representing Mr. W. S. Williford, appeared before council and stated that Mr. Williford had, through the navy department, succeeded in locating George Myers, who was tried here last fall for selling liquor and who skipped out

before other cases were brought against him; and that Mr. Williford, who paid into the city treasury some \$600 as a result of his having gone on Myers' bond, wished to know that if he went to the expense of bringing Myers back here (which would probably cost \$350 or \$400 would the city reimburse him to the amount of the difference in the cost of bringing the man back here and the sum he paid the city when Myers skipped his bond.

The matter was taken up and discussed at some length. It was pointed out that while Mr. Williford had paid the city some \$600 on Myers' bond, this amount was accepted as a compromise for some \$1,600 in bonds that he had gone on for Myers. It was also pointed out that the city would not try Myers, were he brought back here, without considerable additional expense, as the witnesses in the case had become scattered.

E. W. Weaver, of Atlanta, representing the Smith Greater Shows, appeared before council with reference to securing a license for the appearance here of this show.

Upon motion of Alderman Dobbins, the city treasurer was instructed to pay all bills as approved by the auditing committee.

A petition presented by Alderman Bartoo on behalf of William Menefield asking that some steps be taken to stop water overflowing from the street and running across the petitioner's property, to its great damage, was referred to the street committee.

A similar petition presented by Mayor Godfrey on behalf of Mr. J. F. Rice, affecting property on Lindsey street, brought out the fact that the property in question was not within the city limits.

A petition from Alderman Tate that a special committee be appointed to recommend whether the city should take over Rose Hill avenue was received and acted upon favorably.

A letter from President Chas. A. Gambrill of the Petroleum Oil company stating that his company would bear a portion of the cost of extending the Belgian block paving from where it ends on West Earle street to the cotton warehouses at the Anderson Cotton Mills called for a prolonged discussion among aldermen.

the mayor, to investigate and report back to council.

Other Minor Matters. It was reported to council that the basement of the Seligman Building, on the east side of South Main street, between Church and East Market streets, was filled with water and that the health of the community was threatened by this condition of affairs.

City Finance Matter. Upon resolution of Alderman Spearman, the finance committee of council was instructed to proceed with preparations for borrowing money with which to finance the city's affairs for the current year.

The matter of extending the time for payment of city taxes after March 15, when the time expires, was brought up for discussion.

The matter of the city accepting deeds to certain streets in College Heights was referred to the street committee, the city attorney and the city engineer, with instructions to report back.

The last matter taken up was that of electing a city physician. There were but three formal applications before council, these being Dr. Ashmore, the incumbent, Dr. Ross and Dr. Bregdin.
