SUMMER SCHOOL FOR 4 COUNTIES PLANNED

FELTON WOULD UNITE TEACHERS OF ANDERSON, GREENVILLE, PICKENS, OCONEE

AT CLEMSON

Doesn't Think Well of Plan for Summer School at Newberry. Too Far Away

County Superintendent of Education, J. B. Felton has returned from Newberry, where he went Thursday to meet with county superintendents of education of Laurens, Greenwood, Spartanburg, Saluda and Newberry this year for the benefit of teachers of the counties named.

Mr. Felton stated upon his return yesterday that he thought it unwise for Anderson to attempt participation in the plan, as Newberry was too far removed. It is but a short distance to Rock Hill, he stated, and teachers could attend the summer school at Winthrop College about as easy as they could go to one at Newberry.

It is probable that Laurens and Newberry counties will combine and hold a summer school at Newberry, Mr. Felton stated, even though none of the other counties named join with them.

I am working on a plan to have Anderson, Oconee, Pickens and Greenville counties unite in a summer school to be held at Clemson College, said Mr. Felton, and I think the plan will go through. The superintendent stated that he had been working on such a plan for some time, and was confident that the other three counties of the Piedmont section would join in.

Mr. Felton stated that he would have agreed to the Newberry plan of a summer school had they contemplated holding the school at Greenwood, instead of Newberry.

THE CHAUTAUQUA

Committee Appointed to Select a Site for Location of the Chautauqua Tent

Tentative plans for the entertainment of the Clemson College cadet corps, who will encamp here March 22-26, were discussed yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the amusement committee of the chamber of commerce, at organization headquarters at 5:20 o'clock. Plans for the approaching chautauqua were also discussed, but nothing definite decided upon.

The committee appointed F. B. Crayton a committee of one to select a reception board, whose duty it will be to meet the cadets upon their arrival in the city on Monday afternoon.

The cadets will leave Clemson College soon after breakfast on the morning of Monday, March 22, and march to Sandy Springs, where they will have dinner. At this place they will entrain for Anderson, on special cars which will be operated for that purpose. The cadets should arrive in the city about 1 o'clock, and will immediately go to the camp, which will be in readiness for them, on the Roberts property on North Main street.

At the meeting of the amusement committee T. Frank Watkins and Dr. A. L. Smethers were appointed as a committee to select a location for the Redpath Chautauqua, which will hold forth here for a week during the month of May.
