Mr. Richards Will Arrive Here Tonight.
A letter received yesterday at the chamber of commerce from Mr. Edward H. Richards, lately of Willow City, N. D., who is en route to Anderson to take charge of the grain elevator which is to be erected here, stated that he would leave Chicago Monday, March 22, and arrive in Anderson tonight. Mr. Richards is bringing his family with him. Soon after his arrival the grain elevator company will be formally organized, officers elected and work of erecting the grain elevator started.

No Session of The Police Court.
There was no session of the police court yesterday, as there were no defendants to come before the court, to be tried in person or in their absence. This is the first Monday in several months that there has been no session of the recorder's court. For the police dragnet to work from Saturday noon to Monday noon without catching something, is most unusual.

First Announcement of Easter Egg Hunt.
The first announcement of the season of an Easter Egg Hunt came yesterday from members of the Junior Philathea Class of the First Baptist church. A hunt will be given Saturday afternoon, April 3, at 4 o'clock, on the Reed lot on South Main street. Ice cream and strawberries will be served. An admission fee of 10 cents will be charged.

Clerk Pearson Leaves Hospital.
A telegram received in the city Saturday night stated that Mr. James N. Pearson, clerk of court, who went to Rochester, Minn., several days ago to be operated on for appendicitis, would leave the hospital Monday. The next several days will be spent recuperating in his hotel. Mr. Pearson expects to reach home by April 1. His many friends throughout the county will be pleased to hear that he is mending so rapidly.

Deputy Sheriff Sanders is Ill.
Deputy Sheriff J. Olin Sanders has been confined to his home, on South McDuffie street, for several days with a severe attack of grippe. It is understood that several members of his family are suffering from the same malady.

Mr. J. J. Baldwin's Father Very Ill.
Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Baldwin have been called to Columbia on account of the illness of Mr. Baldwin's father, Mr. Frank Baldwin, who is a resident of that city. It is understood that Mr. Baldwin is critically ill and little hope is held out for his recovery. This will be distressing news to Mr. and Mrs. Baldwin's many friends in Anderson.

Cotton Receipts Are Still Off.
Receipts of cotton at the Standard Warehouse up until last Saturday night were 18,218 bales for the season. The receipts of cotton for the corresponding period of last year were 20,783 bales.

Managers Calling For Election Boxes.
Managers appointed for the special election to be held in the county March 31 on the question of voting \$750,000 bonds for good roads are calling for the ballot boxes already, stated a member of the board of commissioners yesterday. Cedar Grove, Cedar Wreath, Three and Twenty, Mount Tabor and Craytonville boxes were called for yesterday. Some of the managers neglected to get the registration rolls, which are in the clerk of court's office. Requirements for voting in the approaching election are the same as for voting in the general election, that is, a registration certificate and tax receipts for 1914 must be presented.

Special Meeting of Elks Last Night.
A special meeting of the local Elks Lodge was held last night to receive Mr. A. J. Ham, of Florence, district deputy grand exalted ruler. A buffet supper was served and a few candidates were initiated into the order. The meeting was a very pleasant one and was greatly enjoyed by those attending.

Third Fire in County Courthouse.
Sunday afternoon about 4 o'clock fire was discovered in the treasurer's office of the county courthouse. The automobile truck wagon was summoned, but the firemen were unable to extinguish the flames with the aid of chemical apparatus. The fire originated in some brooms which were stacked in the corner of the office by the janitor after he finished sweeping Saturday afternoon. An employee of the office, Mr. Louis Green, started into the office about half an hour before the fire, but changed his mind after unlocking the door and did not go in. He says he was not smoking at the time, so the fire could not have originated by his dropping a cigarette on the floor. The damage will not amount to more than \$10.

Myers Deserts From the Navy.
Louis F. Myers, formerly a resident of the city and a fugitive from justice, who left Anderson during the trial of several cases against him for selling liquor, and who later joined the United States navy, has deserted, according to notice received in the city yesterday from the commanding officer of the U. S. S. Milwaukee, the vessel to which Myers was assigned. The news of Myers' desertion comes in a handbill to the police department. Regularly of the law through-out the country batches of handbills telling of the desertion of some soldier or sailor, and offering rewards for their apprehension.

March 31 Last Day For Paying Taxes.
The county treasurer sounds a warning that March 31 is the last day for paying State and county taxes. There will be no time after that for paying taxes with a penalty. April 1 executions will be issued without delay.

It has been announced that Mr. Carl Wiedemann, of Anderson theatre orchestra, and Miss Odie Hembree, of Pauline, S. C., will be married on Easter Sunday. Mr. Wiedemann has been in Anderson but a short while, but during that time has made numerous friends.

There is a fine list of specialties. Negroes Observe Health Week.
Negroes of Anderson, in keeping with a nation wide movement in effect this week, are observing health week. Special exercises are being held in the colored churches. These exercises began Sunday with a splendid talk in the afternoon by the Rev. J. M. Garrison, pastor of the A. R. P. church. The meeting was held at St. Paul's church. Tonight at the C. M. E. church, on Cleveland avenue, an interesting program will be carried out, beginning at 8 o'clock. The topic "Sanitation as a Moral Factor" will be discussed by Dr. W. F. Ashmore. The Rev. H. B. Anderson will make a talk on "Bible Facts as to Health," while the Rev. E. R. Anderson will make a talk relating to health. Two colored physicians of

the city also will speak. Another meeting will be held Friday night.

Regardless of the means necessary to accomplish the end I am heartily in favor of good roads for Anderson county and see no reason why the State of South Carolina cannot have roads equally as good as those of Texas or any other State. Last summer in passing through the Zarline section of Abbeville county, I was attracted by the admirable public spirit which the farmers of that community were showing by lending their spare time, their teams, and their help in constructing the Abbeville-Due West highway. Now it is evident that the majority of the farmers in Anderson county favor good roads, but are against the bond bill. So, in case the issue is defeated, I think it would be no bad idea for them to follow the progressive example of our Abbeville friends and in this way we could soon have roads which would at least be passable during the winter.
