

Anderson Pure Food Company Will Have One of the Most Modern Plants in the State

Indications are that the Anderson Pure Food Lompany, bakers, will move into their elegant new quarters in the Watson-Vandiver building, on North Majn street, next week. The large modern even has been set up as soon as certain equipment which was soon as certain equipment which was soon as certain equipment which was sooned to Anderson Lower was sooned. shipped to Anderson, Ind., instead of to this city arrives everything will be in readiness for the transferring of the business from its present stand on West Benson street to the new quar-

The oven which the company has installed in its new quarters is probably the most modern in this section of the country. It is an immense af-fair, as is indicated by the fact that it can cook 400 full size laves at one can cook 400 full size laves at one time. It is what is known as the "German-American Portable Brick Oven," and is manufactured by the Hubbard Oven Company, of Chicago and New York. Patents on the oven have been taken out in the United States of America, Canada and Europe.

There is a steamer in connection with the oven, and in this respect it is unlike any other oven in this portion of the country. This steamer generates steam and passes it into the oven while the bread is baking, there-by keeping the atmosphere moist and preventing a hard crust forming on the bread and the loaf coming out

dry.

Other modern equipment to be installed in the bakery is an immense sieve machine, machines for mixing the bread and molding it. The big oven has two large doors where the bread is put in and taken out. These doors are so connected with an elec-trical apparatus that when the door is opened for the purpose of looking in at the bread an electric light is turned on, thereby lighting up the The oven burns coke and bread

The oven burns coke and bread a cooked at a temperature of something like 450 degrees.

When the plant has been completed and is ready for operation the management will pro'ably have an "opening day," when the public will be invited to visit the place and inspect a modern bakery.
