For the past several years Mr. Baker has served ably as the district agent for the United States farm demonstration work, having charge of the Pee Dee Counties.

At the present time Mr. Baker is studying the situation carefull. He studying the situation carefull. He will not try to push his plan of reorganizing the corn and pig clubs until the fall. He will try to stimulate interest in the clubs that have already been organized. Next year he hopes to have these clubs organized in every county in the State. He believes that several thousand.

lieves that several thousand boys will be enlisted in the work.

"I will pay particular attention to live stock. I will try to organize as many pig clubs as possible and o

many pig clubs as possible and o course I will not neglect the corn clubs," said Mr. Baker yesterday.

Will Revive Clubs.

Several years ago the corn clubs flourished in South Carolina During the past two years the interest has dwindled. It is the purpose of Mr. Baker to revive interest in the clubs. To do this he must have the cooperation of the schools and of the mothtion of the schools and of the mothers and fathers. "These young boys will be the fathers of tom. rrow," said Mr. Baker, "and I will use every effort to make them successful farm-

South Carolina is one of the first States in the South to have an agent in charge of these agricultural clubs In charge of these agricultural clubs and the work here will be watched with interest by the officers in the national department of agriculture.

Crop rotation, soil building and the growing of live stock will be especially stressed in the campaign which Mr. Baker is conducting.

The work is to be done in conjunction with the extension department of Clemson College.
