CLEMSON COLLEGE PREPARING A TREAT FOR FARMERS OF THIS SECTION

POULTRY EXHIBIT IS INCLUDED

Experts Will Lecture on Dairying and Poultry Raising and Give Practical Demonstrations.

The coming of this car is announced in large display posters which have been sent out by Prof. W. W. Long, State Agent and Director of Extension Work, with headquarters at Clemson College. Ladies are specially invited to attend the lectures and view the demonstrations. Particularly interesting. In view of the fact that cream route work was recently started out of Anderson, and has met with such phenomenal success, the announcement of coming of this car will doubtless prove of particular interest to a large number of people of Anderson county, and particularly those living along this cream route. Prof. D. W. Watkins, dairy expert of Clemson College, has been in the city recently investigating the practicability of starting up another cream route here. He has been making a survey of the situation with a view of establishing a route that would start in the city and go in the direction of Belton, by way of the Drake place. IN COUNTY COURT HOUSE TO HEAR ADDRESS ON THE CLEAN UP CAMPAIGN

A mass meeting of citizens of Anderson has been called for 8 o'clock of the evening of April 16, in the county court house, for the purpose of listening to addresses relating to "clean up and paint up" week, which is to be observed in this city this month. The call for the meeting was issued yesterday by Dr. W. Frank Ashmore, chairman of the board of health and chairman of the general committee in charge of arrangements for the clean up campaign. Dr. E. A. Hines, secretary of the State Medical Association, and superintendent of the Anderson County Hospital, is one of the speakers secured for the mass meeting. An invitation has been extended Dr. J. Adam Hayes of Columbia, secretary of the State Board of Health and State health officer, to deliver an address at this mass meeting. Clean up and paint up week is to be observed April 19 to 24.
