Mr. Trowbridge will dispose of the stock at a clean up sale which will be held in the next few days. It will be disposed of at an open sale.

Mr. Trowbridge is considered a good bargain driver, as shown by the fact that he purchased \$3,400 worth of merchandise and store fixtures for the sum of \$1,160. Among the fixtures purchased were six National cash registers.

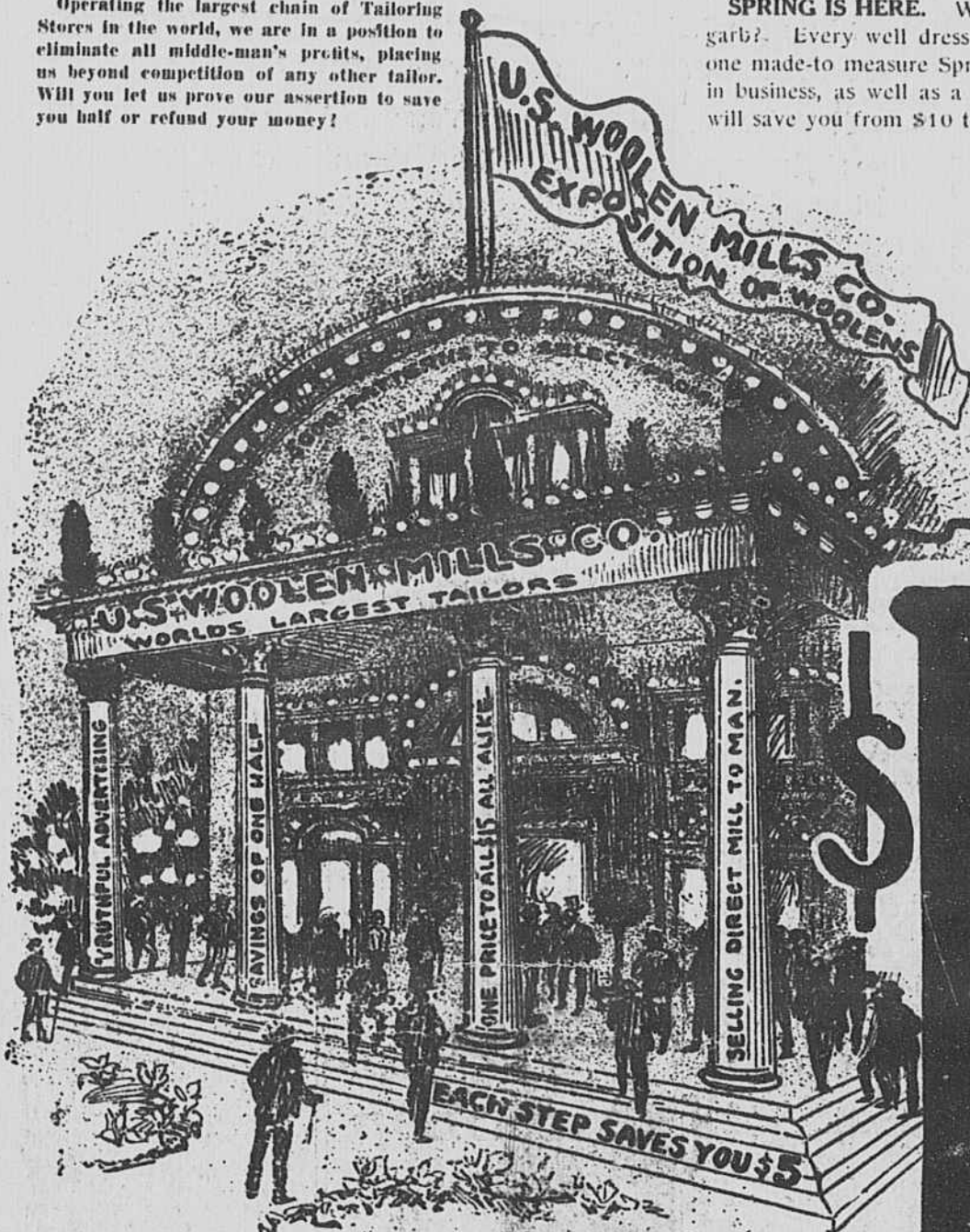
