"The management committee of the Federation," says the resolution, "has evidence of serious physical and mental overstrai nand increasing sicktal overstrai nand increasing sick-ness rates, and it believes that the aggregate output of munitions of wa: would be increased if labor and fa cilies were properly organized and proper rest periods provided. "The committee has evidence that
