UNIONS OPPOSE SUNDAY WORK

Can Produce More Munitions of War if Given Regular Rest Periods.

LONDON, April 8.—The abolition of all Sunday work in munition factories is strongly urged by the General Federation of Trade Unions in a resolution, copies of which are being sent to Government officials and to all employees of labor. "The management committee of the Federation," says the resolution, "has evidence of serious physical and mental overstrain and increasing sickness rates, and it believes that the aggregate output of munitions of war would be increased if labor and facilities were properly organized and proper rest periods provided. "The committee has evidence that cases of breakdown, due to overwork have occurred in some of the factories in the North. Among girl workers, who have been required to work at high pressure, fainting fits have been common. "In one case where it was alleged that 120 employees of a munition factory did not turn up to work on Monday, we have discovered that a large number of them were teetotalers and workers in the temperance movement and they had simply stayed at home to catch up on their necessary sleep.

FEDERAL LEAGUE OPENS SEASON President Gilmore Pre-dicts Prosperous Season—Opening Game in Kansas City. CHICAGO, April 9.—Predicting a prosperous season this season "The best so far," President Gilmore left for Kansas City, where tomorrow he will watch the opening game of the Federal league campaign. Most Federal teams, according to their managers, have improved greatly.

WOMEN TO DRIVE AMBULANCES

Ask Permission So Men Can Serve Their Country at Front.

PARIS, April 9.—The French Women's Automobile club has begun enrolling women motorists, aviators and balloonists to form a brigade of ambulances for the French army. Applications are coming at the rate of 100 a day. The organization aims to find enough capable women conductors to replace all men now driving ambulances who are capable of rendering better services at the front. Four women aviators, including Mme. Paller, Baroness de la Roche and Mile. Helene Dutrieu, who had been refused admission to the aviation corps, have joined this movement. Many applicants for enrollment have been made by women motorcycleists who want to act as drivers at the front.

GERMANS WILL REBUILD VILLAGES

VIENNA, April 9.—(via London).—At the war office today the following statement was issued: "Obstinate fighting in the section of the East Baskid mountains (along the boundary between Hungary and Galicia), which has lasted for several weeks, reached its climax at Easter. Continual Russian attacks, especially on both sides of the Laborca valley where the enemy was reinforced by a majority of the troops which had besieged Przemyel, were repulsed with enormous losses to the enemy. Counterattacking, German and Austrian troops captured on the heights to the west and east of the valley several strong Russian positions. "Though the fighting at this point has not yet terminated, our success in the Easter battle, in which some 10,000 unbound prisoners were captured, is indisputable. "In some parts of the wooded districts east of the Laborca valley severe fighting is progressing. "In southeast Galicia there have been artillery combats at some places. "In west Galicia and Russian Poland it is comparatively quiet."
