MINOR MATTERS WERE BEFORE CITY COUNCIL

COMPLAINTS MADE AS TO ODORS ARISING FROM A MEAT MARKET

HEALTH OFFICER

Instructed To Have the Situation Remedied—Other Matters.

At a special meeting of city council convened yesterday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, in the council chamber, consideration was given several matters, the most important of which were the selection of a site for the new city barn and the new schedule of rates for lighting submitted by the Southern Public Utilities company for approval. These two matters are treated in other columns of this paper this morning. Of the minor matters brought before council at the special meeting that of complaints as to the condition of Maness' Meat Market, on the west side of North Main street between the Eagle Barber Shop and Marchbanks & Babbs, jewelers, was the most important.

Alderman Barton reported that several merchants and other business people in the vicinity of Maness' Meat Market had come to him with complaints as to obnoxious odors coming from the market, and asked for relief. The matter was referred to the health officer, with instructions to get in after the matter and remedy the situation.

It was brought to the attention of a Mr. Hamby who has been selling pianos in the city without paying the required license. It appears that there is nothing in the license ordinance providing a license for an itinerant piano dealer, or one who conducts his business along such lines as this man. Council was of the opinion that the man ought to be required to pay a license of some amount, so the matter with the acting city attorney, E. F. Cochran, to work out.

Dr. Nanzetta, an Indian medicine vendor, appeared before council and asked for a license to do business in the city. He stated that last year he had done business here and that council at that time charged him a license of \$10 for the first week he was here and \$5 a week thereafter. It was agreed that license in this amount would be charged him this year.

A request from Ensign Belcher of the Salvation Army that council make a small appropriation to meet certain overdrafts and outstanding bills which the organization here had to meet was referred to the Anderson Relief Association.

CONVICT CAMP MOVED INTO CENTERVILLE

WORK IN ROCK MILLS HAS BEEN FINISHED AFTER SEVERAL MONTHS

WORK OUTLINED

Earle's Bridge Road To Be Worked And Road From National Highway to 6 and 20.

"We have moved convict camp No. 2 from Rock Mills to Centerville and for the next several weeks will be engaged in working roads between the city and Earle's bridge and from the National Highway to Six and Twenty Creek," said Supervisor J. Mack King yesterday. The camp is pitched near the plantation of W. John McClure, on the Earle's Bridge road, and is in charge of Capt. J. W. Cook. There are some 40 convicts, three road scrapes and 30 mules in the outfit. As generally known, the camp has been stationed in Rock Mills for the past several months making some improvements near Major's Mill. A new bridge was built across the stream near the mill and a road was relocated for a considerable distance in that locality. Various other improvements of an important nature were carried out.

Superior King states that for the next several weeks the convict force will be engaged in working the road extending from the National Highway to Six and Twenty, after which the road from the city limits to Earle's Bridge, over Sebeka river, will be improved. In speaking of the matter yesterday Mr. King stated that he would like to impress upon the farmers the necessity of their impressing upon their plow hands not to plough into the road when working in the fields adjoining the highways, as good roads could never be had so long as this was allowed.

No Food Shortage in Germany. BERLIN, April 16.—In order to convince his American friends that Germany is not suffering from a shortage of food, it is reported that the American consul in Munich has asked restaurant keepers to supply him with their bills of fare for one week. These he intends to send to his friends in the United States.

ANDERSON COLLEGE

An unusually artistic program was presented by the members of the faculty of the departments of music on Monday evening. After having heard each of these musicians in the faculty recital in the fall, Anderson people knew what to expect at this second public appearance of the group. The comment that has been often heard was of the exquisite musical taste in the choice and arrangement of the program and the artistic rendition of each number. Miss Stranathan opened the program with a Mozart Aria from the marriage of Figaro, singing it in Italian, with all its light and shades as interpreted by Miss Stranathan stirred the hearts of those who heard, irrespective of the Italian words which some affect to believe distract from the enjoyment of a song. The three German songs show Miss Stranathan's keen appreciation of great music. The last number gave a delightful variety to her selections. The Dreamy Sleep with its quiet longing was followed by Ah, Love But A Day! This was perhaps the biggest number on her program. In this music one feels that Mrs. Beach has been able to express the thought of the words more adequately than others who have done the attempt. Miss Stranathan gave a very sincere interpretation of the power of the song, "The Bird of the group was Leonora, singing in brilliant style with delightful purity of tone. Particularly noticeable was Miss Stranathan's clear enunciation, and also pronunciation. In whatever language she sings, English, French, German or Italian each word is as a perfectly formed pearl.

Miss Nelle Smith, violinist, played second. Her selections were unusually beautiful. She played as always with spirit and fire, typical of one of her temperament, evincing considerable artistic poise. Liebestraund, one of Kreisler's bright compositions she performed brilliantly with good style and taste. Her interpretation was ample to show the contrast in her second number, being probably at her best in Beethoven's Sonatina. The biggest number, and most brilliant was the Scherzo by Von Loons. This difficult number was played with ease and with a strength rarely found in one of such slight physique. The long sustained tones of Leo Adieux by Pablo Sarasate, so trying to the violinist were beautifully done by Miss Smith. The double stopping and skipping octaves were executed skillfully, and each number was intensely pleasing to the audience.

Mr. Goode was surely at his best in his part of the program. He is a rare pianist and his musicianship is of the highest order. He is masterful in style with a splendid technique a sure touch, and an interpretation that comes only from the combination of intellect, temperament, good taste and judgment. His first number consisted of three Chopin Preludes followed by the Etude that is commonly known as Revolutionary Etude. Very few selections make such demands on a sure technique as does this Etude, which he played. So wonderfully, in the Debussy Minstrels an exceedingly graceful composition, he showed unusually keen appreciation and fine musical feeling. La Campanella by Liszt was a beautiful climax of the program. This was played as only a true artist can play it. His style was exquisite, and the effect of the number was very impressive. He played it with a fluency and artistry that were very unusual.

The accompaniments were played by Mrs. F. A. Goode. While Mrs. Goode did not appear on the program as a soloist, as well as a delightful accompanist, as will be remembered by those who heard her in the former recital. As before, she played a pleasing accompaniment, very sympathetic and skillful. It is a true accomplishment to play such difficult accompaniments well, and Mrs. Goode's accompanying was admirable. The students gave a most delightful reception to their friends on Thursday evening. There was a good crowd in attendance and a most delightful evening was spent. The parlors and corridors were very prettily decorated in Japanese style with pink peach blossoms, and green in profusion. An ice course was served during the evening.

The college, on that day turned over its plant and large campus to the people of the county.
