## NEW DEMONSTRATION AGENT HERE TODAY

S. M. BYARS WILL TAKE UP HIS NEW DUTIES ON MONDAY

## IS A GOOD MAN

Is Recommended Highly By President Harrison Of Southern Railway.

Anderson county's new agricultural demonstrator, S. M. Byars, will arrive here tonight and Monday morning will take up his new duties. For the past few days Mr. Byars has been at Clemson College in conference with Prof. W. W. Long, state agent of the farmers' cooperative demonstration and extension work, familiarizing himself with certain features of the work that he will do in this county.

Mr. Byars is a native of Mississippi and comes to Anderson from that State. He was recommended to Prof. Long as a splendid man for Anderson county by President Fairfax Harrison of the Southern Railway. Mr. Byars having been associated with the agricultural work of the Southern for some years.

Interviewed yesterday by a reporter for The Intelligencer, Prof. Long spoke very highly of Mr. Byars, both personally and as to his ability. "He is a young man and exceptionally industrious man," said Prof. Long, "but little to say an believes in making his work speak for itself. I am sure he is going to make Anderson county a splendid demonstration agent. I talked with him about the new position he is going to take and gave him to understand it was no easy job he was taking up, and his reply to me was: 'Well, Prof. Long, I will succeed or I will kill myself trying.'"

Prof. Long stated that the new agent had been recommended to him by President Harrison of the Southern as one of the best men that had ever been in the employ of his company, and he is confident that he will please the people of Anderson county.

Mr. Byars will bring his family to Anderson with him. He intends going about the agricultural work in a thorough business like manner, and one of the first things he intends doing after reaching here is getting an automobile to use in his rounds through the county.

## PLANS FOR CATTLE FEEDING DISCUSSED

PROF. LONG WOULD DIVIDE STATE INTO FOUR DISTRICTS

## MARKET CENTERS

Would Be Established In Each District—Sale At Greenwood Success.

Plans for dividing South Carolina into some four districts, with a marketing center for each district, and carrying on cattle feeding work on a large scale, such as that which has been done already on a small scale and Greenwood and other counties of the State, were discussed informally yesterday by Prof. W. W. Long, state agent of the farmers' cooperative and demonstration and extension work, when interviewed by a reporter for The Intelligencer.

Prof. Long mentioned this matter in the course of conversation relating to the recent sale of beef cattle at Greenwood which had been fattened under the direction of Prof. L. O. Williams, in charge of the animal husbandry work at Clemson College. He was greatly pleased with the sale of cattle at Greenwood. Ninety-eight head of specially fattened animals were disposed of for splendid prices.

In discussing the matter yesterday, Prof. Williams stated that the cattle had been fed for 90 days, but that hereafter in carrying on this work he was going to arrange for the cattle to be fed 120 days instead. It was then that Prof. Long mentioned his plan of dividing the State into four districts for this cattle fattening work and have marketing centers in each of these districts. As yet he has not laid out the districts or determined upon what towns or cities will be the marketing centers. Prof. Long believes that there is a great future for this work in South Carolina, and is anxious to see it tried out on a larger scale.

## FOUND MARKET TO BE IN SANITARY SHAPE

W. J. Maness States That State Health Officer Finds No Fault.

"Dr. J. Adam Hayne, state health officer; Dr. W. H. Nardin, secretary of the local board of health; and Dr. John Major, meat and milk inspector of the city, visited my meat market this morning, and, after a thorough examination of the premises, Dr. Hayne pronounced its sanitary condition perfectly satisfactory, and stated that it was a credit to most meat markets in the State," declared W. J. Maness last night, proprietor of a market on the west side of North Main street, between Marchbanks & Babbs, jewelers, and the Eagle Barber shop.

Mr. Maness' remarks were made in the nature of a reply to what transpired in a special meeting of city council held Friday afternoon, when an alderman reported that several persons had come to him with complaints as to obnoxious odors coming from Maness' market and asked for relief, resulting in Dr. Major being instructed to investigate the place, and, if anything wrong was discovered, have the same remedied.

"Dr. Major stated to me that he would substantiate what was said by Dr. Hayne," declared Mr. Maness, "and my place is open at all times to all persons for inspection, and I cordially invite them to come around at any time and make an inspection of the place from top to bottom. The doctor's went down into the basement of my place this morning and the only objectionable thing they found was a sour smell that came from the cellar. I am going to try and eliminate this sour smell, although I have not used the basement for any purpose whatever for more than a year.

Mr. Maness stated that the condition of the basement was due to a situation he found there when he purchased the market. He described the condition of the basement at that time as being fearfully bad. "But I put men to work in it," he declared, "and had gave the basement a thorough cleaning. It is now as dry as can be. Of course, when I took hold of the market I tried to put it in perfect sanitary condition, but odors and decayed matter had soaked into the ground in the basement before that. When a damp spell comes now these odors, of course, rise again and when the east wind blows it creates a suction through the ventilators of my place and this draws the odors from the basement."

Mr. Maness reiterated the statement that he does not use this basement, and has not used it for more than a year. He declared that he is going to do his best to obliterate the odors or the sour smell when Dr. Hayne mentioned after this investigation of the place.
