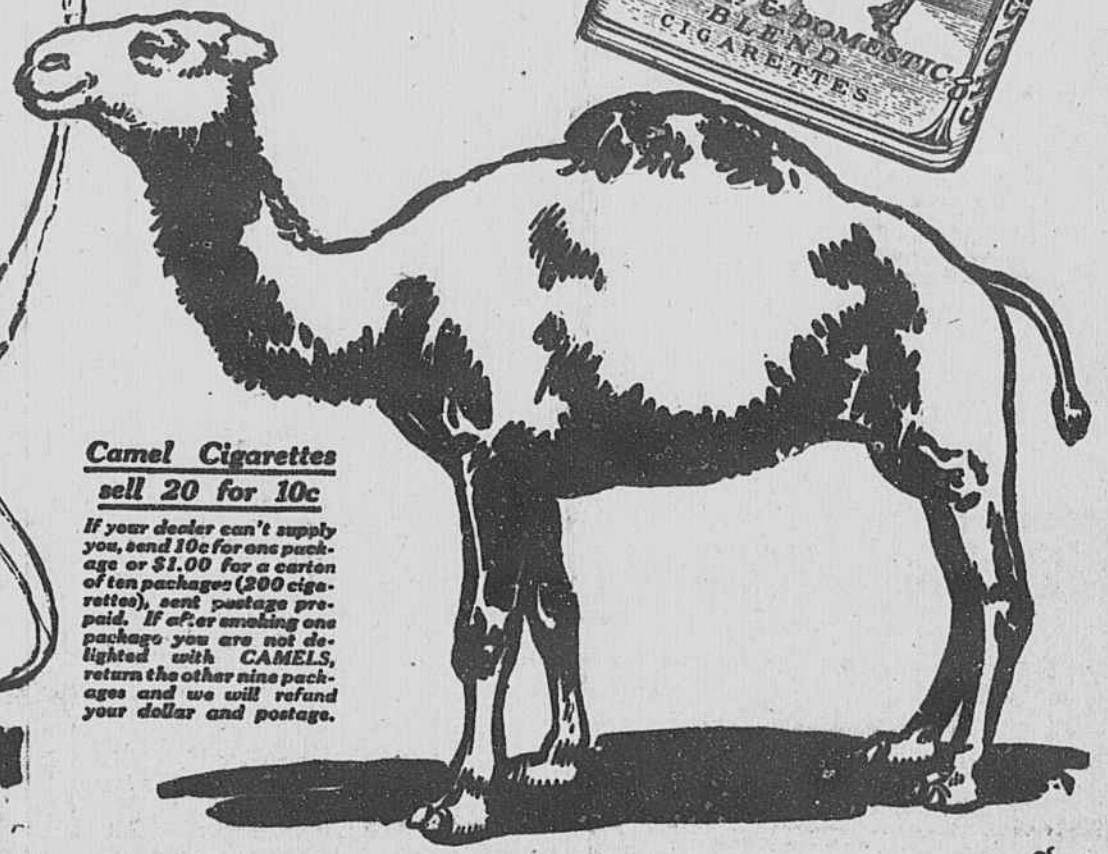

Several of the negroes were provided with gloves, and those who had this protection did not hesitate to grasp rats in their hands and either squeeze the life out of them or dash them to death against the ground.
